THE Government dredge Prince Edward is now almost ready for work. Her first job will be dredging of the docks at Peakes No. 1 wharf, which will probably be begun next week.

H. PETHICK, who is to be the new manager of the Bank of New Brunswick, here, came by the Princess yesterday. A. E. Williams, the present manager will leave for Moncton, it is expected, on Saturday.

The steamer Electra, arrived at Montague Bridge yesterday, opening navigation although there is still some ice. She is two days earlier getting into Montague this year than last year. The rain has played havoc with the roads in all directions near Montague.

It is a matter of generally expressed regret that Professor Readey, the energetic Secretary of the Provincial Department of Agriculture has decided to resign his position. During his incumbency he has worked hard and enthusiastically to bring his department up to such a state, that it would properly represent the importance of the interests of agriculture in Prince Edward Island.

FOUR nurses from the Prince Edward Island Hospital—Misses Williamson, Coffin, McSwain, and Sharp, graduates of the institution, will receive their diplomas on Monday night at a public gathering in the Kindergarten Hall.

A PUBLIC meeting will be held at Milton at 4 o'clock p. m. on Wednesday 28th, May to consider the matter of automobiles running upon the highway. The members representing the district in the Legislature and all others interested are invited. The meeting is expected to be a large and interesting one.

THE Maritime express from Halifax was nearly four hours late arriving at Moncton on Saturday being detained at Truro waiting for the Sydney train. An accident to a special on the New Glasgow division caused the delay. A number of cars were broken up in the run off.

AT the children's concert in the basement of the First Methodist church last night there was a good attendance, and all enjoyed themselves. The little ones looked very winsome in their white dresses, and they and the older ones acted well their parts. Prof. Walter's orchestra attended and the music was as usual delightful. The History of the Flag, by three boys was a particularly well rendered feature of the program. The closing number was followed by three cheers for the Red White and Blue, and God Save the King.

DR. VARIEN of St. John's, Nfld., has been on the Island for the past week picking up some good horses for customers in the ancient colony. He has rounded up six fine horses for the city of St. John's, and two splendid mares a matched pair of bays for the Nfld. Government Farm. The balance of the lot of 15 head which he is taking away are for private parties. The pair of mares are for breeding purposes. The Government stables at St. John's have two first class stallions—one a coach horse that cost \$2400, and the other a barrister procured in this Island. The progeny of the mares will be distributed in Nfld., the Government being anxious to improve the class of horses and encourage breeding. The stables at St. John's Nfld., Dr. Varien says, contain the very best horses, and every encouragement is given breeders to raise the best. While Dr. Varien was here he also purchased a thoroughbred Berkshire sow with five little ones. These he left in care of Robert Silliphant, Hunter River, to await shipment. Last night the Dr. received a telephone message to say that some thief had stolen one of the little pigs—which shows that good stock is appreciated. Dr. Varien left this morning on return to Nfld.

THE preparations for the Firemen's Tournament are proceeding steadily and a big meeting of firemen is bound to result. Definite replies have been received from the Fire Depts of Glouce Bay, Moncton, and Pictou; from all of which places men are coming to participate in the sports. Letters have also been received from Halifax, Sydney, Amherst, Truro, and Woodstock, which indicate that firemen from these cities will also be present at the celebration. Of the tournament the Glouce Bay Herald says:—"Although the Charlottetown tournament does not come off until the first and second days of August the firemen all over the maritime provinces are already making preparations to attend it and take with them their best teams. The Glouce Bay fire department have not definitely decided to go in a body, but in all probability they will be there and have in the most of the events men fast and strong enough to make the best of them hustler. It will require about \$300 to make the trip and the department has nothing near that amount in funds at present. The picnic season will be on before that however, and the fire ladders are always well patronized. The magnificent work of the department has saved many of the citizens of Glouce Bay from heavy loss, and the boys are deserving of every assistance to make a good showing at the tournament. The Glouce Bay men would be in all the sporting events except the salvage tarp races, and the tug of war. The department had good men last year and they are stronger this year. Of last year's teams they have W. Rutherford, J. W. McKenzie, L. Frizell, A. McMullen, U. Breen, F. White and A. Cathcart, Rutherford is a crack quarter mile and this year Glouce Bay has in Charlie Harte, formerly of Sydney, the fastest couple in the maritime provinces, and in Bert Finnmore, one of the best men New Brunswick had last year.

REV. J. W. and Mrs. Godfrey, of Truro, are spending a week in Charlottetown with Mr. Godfrey's sister, Mrs. J. K. Ross. The congregation of St. John's Church of England at Crapaud is endeavoring to secure Mr. Godfrey as rector, and his present visit is made for the purpose of conferring with the wardens of St. John's.

THE arrivals the past few days of commercial men and others have resulted in good business at the hotels. The Victorias, Queen and Bevere, have had all they could handle without overtaxing their usual limitations for winter trade. An exceptionally large number arrived in the city yesterday and the day before.

THE mail train arrived in the city this morning at 1.10 a. m. The condition of the road bed all along the line of railway is very bad at present—the frost having raised the sleepers in some places so much that the trains have to run slowly. The track however is improving and will soon be in its usual good order.

YESTERDAY afternoon when the western train from Charlottetown was near Loyalist a box car left the track. In order not to have traffic interrupted the car was turned over and into the ditch along the track. A similar accident occurred on the Murray Harbor Branch, near Vernon River but the car was replaced after a half hour of delay.

THE marriage took place at St. Andrew's on April 24th of Peter J. Morrison to Annie M. McDonald, both of Mt. Stewart. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. A. P. McLellan, P. E. assisted by Revs. R. J. Gillis, St. Peter's, A. J. McIntyre, Morell and J. R. McDonald, St. Teresa's. The bride was attended by her sister Miss Eille, while the groom was supported by D. F. Egan.

THE purchase of the site on corner of Grafton and Prince Streets for the new Zion church has been completed. It includes the land on Prince Street from the corner to Mr. Whalen's property and on Grafton Street to the Lewis property, and all the buildings thereon, including the Yeo house. The trustees have also agreed with Mr. Whalen to purchase his property adjoining Mr. Longworth's on Prince Street for \$300. Then the whole site will cost the congregation \$4,450.

IN line with the gigantic scheme of immigration organized by the venerable head of the Salvation Army, evidence of the success of which is noticeable even in this Province, comes the news that General Booth has made the startling proposition to take over the control and management of the jails and penitentiaries of Great Britain. He guarantees to manage them more economically, and with better results, physically, socially and morally, than at present, and as a demonstration of the feasibility of the proposition he asks to be given the control of the jails and penitentiaries of any specified district for three years.

Very satisfactory reports are being received by Prof. Hawley regarding the English immigrants brought to this province by him in connection with the Salvation Army emigration scheme. Only in one case has there been a statement made that the man furnished was not a capable laborer, and this was where an experienced man was required. The first man sent was replaced by one able to fulfil the duties required of him. From the immigrants have come expressions of their gratitude to the Army for enabling them to better their condition in life, and of appreciation of the present places in which their lines have fallen.

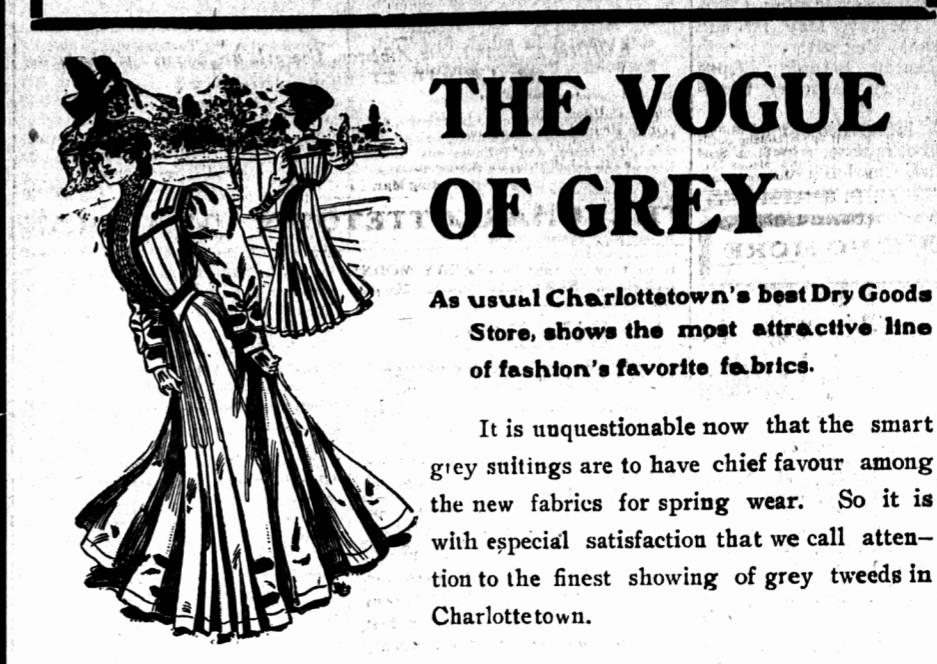
