DENTAL OFFICES SCORCHED.

The dental offices of Dr. Heath McIntyre in the Cameron Block were badly scorched by a fire which broke out about 10 o'clock Saturday morning. When the firemen arrived they first tried the chemical engine and afterwards turned on the water. By splendid work they soon had the fire under control and confined to the Doctor's two offices. All the contents dental stock, furniture, etc., were destroyed and the woodwork badly charred. The interior was also damaged by water and smoke and the Doctor himself had his clothing partially burned. The adjoining office of Laphorn and Burke Agents for the North American Life Assurance Co., was slightly damaged by smoke and water. Dr. McIntyre's loss is estimated at from \$1200 to \$1500. It is partially covered by insurance.

SUBSTITUTE ORDER CANCELLED.

The first order of the Canada food board issued after the signing of the armistice fulfills the board's undertaking to withdraw as many war-caused restrictions on food as possible at the earliest moment says an Ottawa despatch. Following the action of the Allied food controllers, all orders and rulings, requiring the sale, purchase, use or consumption of substitutes for wheat flour are repealed from Thursday, whether in the trade or in private homes. The main factor enabling this to be done is the immediate release of Allied shipping to make the voyages from Europe to Argentina, India and Australia, where there are accumulated stocks of wheat. Wheat substitutes only are affected by the new order. The same regulations as hitherto will remain for the milling extraction of standard flour.

PELT SALES.

The directors of Seal River Black Fox Co. have received from C. M. Lamson and Company account sales of 13 pelts placed on the London market. The highest price received was 240 pounds (\$1200) for one skin, with lesser amounts for the others, the general average being high. There were 659 skins sold at the October sales and the Seal River Company received the top price. This Company has done exceptionally well with regard to live foxes and pelts.

MARINE AGENCY TRANSFER.

About one half the lightships, fog alarm stations and buoys now looked after by the Nova Scotia agency of the Marine Department will be transferred to the care of the St. John and Charlottetown agencies. St. John gets the whole of the Bay of Fundy, taking about sixty lights and eleven fog alarm stations and the Charlottetown agency will have all the lights on the Nova Scotia coast from Colostream Head down to Cape North in Cape Breton with the lights now in the New Brunswick agency on the north shore of that province. There are now three steamers attached to the Nova Scotia agency, and it is likely one of them, the Stanley, will come to Charlottetown and the other, the Arammore to St. John. While this arrangement will greatly equalize the work of the three agencies it will nevertheless be a loss to Halifax, as the supplies have always been purchased there.

FUNERAL SATURDAY.

The funeral of the late Miss Jean Stewart, whose death of pneumonia in Edmonton on the 6th inst. has already been recorded in the Guardian, was held Saturday afternoon. A large number of sympathizing friends being present to pay the last tribute of respect to one whom all loved and who in the prime of young womanhood had given her life in the service of others. She had volunteered her services in nursing influenza patients in a hospital at Edmonton and contracted the disease while there. The services at her funeral Saturday were conducted by Rev. O. B. Emery assisted by Rev. J. Dougald McKenzie. There were many floral offerings, mute tributes of esteem and sympathy from friends and neighbors. The body was laid to rest in the Cross Roads Cemetery, Lot 48.
