LORRAINE OFFENSIVE HAS BEEN STARTED

French and Americans Launched Attack Against St. Mihiel Salient on Two Fronts of Twelve and Eight Miles. Americans Captured Ten Villages on Way to Metz.

(Special to The Guardian) There are some indications that the Germans are withdrawing their artillery although it is more probable that they are going to fight hard before being driven out after enduring a stiffening barrage of more than eight hours.

AMERICAN TROOPS LAND AT ARCHANGEL

Czecho-Slovaks Have Cut Their Way to the Pacific Coast Where They Have Joined Allied Troops. Serious Conditions in Russia but a Nucleus Exists of a Great Army Which Will Eventually Clear the Country of Bolsheviks and Germans.

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, Sept. 12.—American troops in what numbers it is not disclosed, have been landed at Archangel to reinforce the Allied army now operating in northern Russia.

BOSTON WINS THE CHAMPIONSHIP

(Special to The Guardian) BOSTON, Sept. 12.—Taps for professional baseball for the duration of the war was sounded at Fenway Park yesterday when the Boston American League Pennant winners, won the first war-scarred baseball championship of the world by defeating the Chicago National League in the sixth game of the series for the overlordship of the Boston World in as many states, and as the Boston Nationals won the championship in 1914, it brings to this city seven world's titles without one blot on its escutcheon.

The line, despite much bombardment during last fall and winter when the Allies were close up to it, is of great breath and density. Seen even from a considerable distance it is far more dense than were the famous wire entanglements of the Chemin Des Dames. A tank attack on a great scale would doubtless crush the wire into the earth but the shell pitting especially on the south western front of the town towards which the French are making their approach is such that a tank attack cannot be made with hope of success unless the surface of the ground is dry and the shell holes have little water in them.

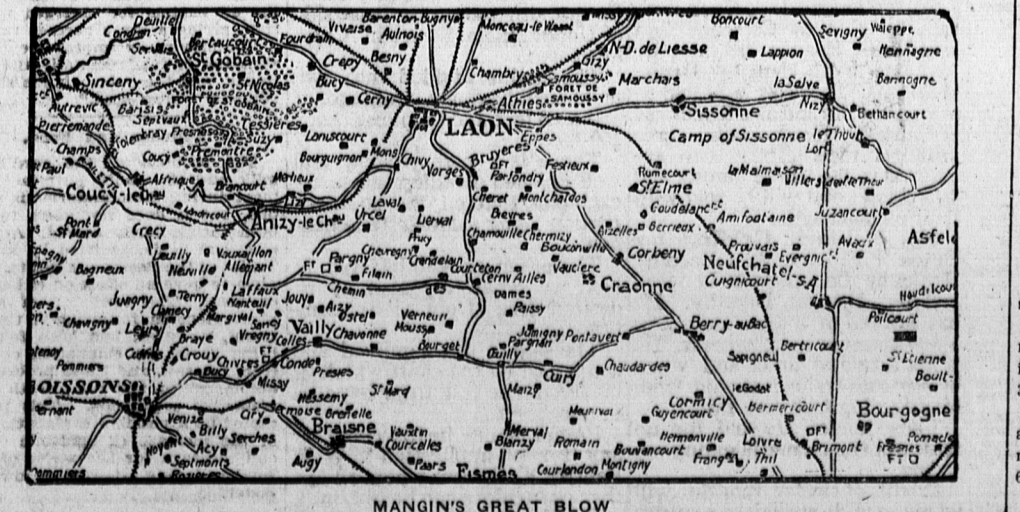

SAVE GASOLINE FOR WAR PURPOSES

After consultation with the fuel controller, and learning the seriousness of the gasoline situation, the Special Thrift Committee of Canada is calling upon automobile owners to discontinue all Sunday riding for pleasure, commencing next Sunday, Sept. 15th. In view of the fact that every gallon of gasoline in sight is needed for war purposes, and that the present excessive consumption is not only further reducing the quantity available, but materially increasing the cost, both to the government for war purposes and to private individuals for their immediate requirements it is urged and expected that every patriotic autoist will cheerfully and voluntarily comply with this reasonable request, and so obviate the necessity of enacting legislation to compel curtailment. It is estimated that \$150,000 worth of gasoline is unnecessarily consumed in Canada every Sunday and this quantity of gasoline, as well as the money unnecessarily expended upon it can be saved, by a general and patriotic compliance with this request.



MANGIN'S GREAT BLOW At the upper left hand corner of this map is area in which the French under General Mangin have delivered another slashing blow at the enemy. Coucy has been re-taken and Fresnes (a little up to the right) occupied, thus giving the French a foothold in the crest of St. Gobain, which is only three miles from St. Gobain itself, possession of which would give the French command of the Laon plateau and would make the fall of Laon inevitable. United States forces are with this army.
