### POLAR BEAR INVADERS AN ESKIMO VILLAGE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Dillon Wallace, the Arctic explorer, who was recently given up for lost by his friends, is back among them today with interesting details of his trip to Labrador. He had gone to place a bronze tablet at the head waters of the Susan River, where his companion, Leonidas Hubbard, Jr., died of starvation two years ago. He succeeded in finding the camp, but could not erect the tablet, as it had fallen out of his canoe to the bottom of the Beaver River. Not to be outdone, however, he laboriously chiseled upon the rock: "Leonidas Hubbard, Jr., Intrepid Explorer and Practical Christian, Died Here October 18, 1903."

At an Eskimo village called Nartuk he found the Eskimos astray over a recent tragedy. An elderly man named Korah, who had come to the village with his 16 year old son Jonas to spend the night, woke up in the morning to find a big polar bear standing over the half eaten body of his son. The Eskimos went after the bear and killed it. When its body was examined it was found to be half starved. Its attack on Jonas created great surprise, as no one could remember a polar bear being driven by hunger to come down to a village and kill anyone to eat.

### BREAKING OF EGGS COSTS \$40,000,000

MINNEAPOLIS, MINN., Nov. 7.—That 100,000,000 gallons of water is carried every year from the corn belt into the East and freight paid on it as each, and that \$40,000,000 a year is needlessly lost in the breaking of eggs due to improper packing were two startling statements by Dr. Carl L. Alsberg, chief of the Bureau of Chemistry in the federal Department of Agriculture, in an address before the students of the University of Minnesota in a chapel. Dr. Alsberg was in Minneapolis attending the trial of a test case under the federal pure food law.

"The Bureau of Chemistry is working along two general lines, regulative and constructive," said Dr. Alsberg. "We are trying with the slight power that is conferred upon us to regulate the composition of all food products so that the public shall not pay fancy prices for inferior goods, as well as that it shall not be fed poisonous and dangerous noxious without its knowledge. We are also trying to educate the shipper in economical ways of manufacturing and shipment in order to cut the cost of living."

"It is in his pocketbook that the average man is now most affected. The department's activities have pretty well eradicated the danger of poisonous adulterations. It is in the misbranding that the big room for reform is now so strikingly apparent. That is, alleging that an article contains higher grade ingredients than it really contains and asserting that it cannot accomplish."

"It is under the misbranding feature that we came here in the prosecution of the William Radam Microbe Killer Company, of New York, for shipment of the "killer" to Minneapolis.

"Improvement of the food supply lowering the cost of distribution and educating the producer and distributor in conservation of supply are among the chief problems now before the department. For example, we would like to show the people how to save the freight on 100,000,000 gallons of water carried every year from the corn belt and paid for at the rate of corn, for every season that unnecessary moisture is carried in the corn. Then we would like to show the shipping how they can save \$40,000,000 a year in eggs that are broken by reason of being improperly packed. Of course the consumer pays for this freight, and of course he pays the \$40,000,000 lost in eggs. Here are two glaring instances, and there are many more. They all add to the cost of living."

### SPEAR POINTS ENCIRCLE AN EXCAVATED SKULL.

NEW ALBANY, Ind., Nov. 7.—The bones of a human being, possibly of aborigine, have been dug up by Albert Hume on his chicken farm on the river road at Clarksville, between New Albany and Jeffersonville. In one case the skull was surrounded, as it lay in the earth, with a halo of flint spear points.

The farm is in site of interest. It was here, legend says, that De Soho's unfaithful treasurer was killed, and his treasurer buried, and here men dug for the legendary wealth. Mr. Hume never has given credence to such stories and when he first found the spear points and bones he was making a hot bed near his home.

"The bones were a few feet under the surface, and when exposed a crumpled. Later, when spading a garden, his spade struck something solid, and, on investigation, he found a skull. The spear points were placed around it. That skull crumpled. He noticed that the bones had been found under a slight elevation. A slight mound one hundred feet long, evidently had been made by the people who used it for a burial ground.

### SYNOD OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND

FREDERICTON, Nov. 7.—At yesterday afternoon's session of the Church of England Synod, Mr. J. Simon Armstrong moved: That whereas it is very desirable that the divine services of the Church of England in the Diocese of Fredericton should be conducted in a decent orderly and reverent manner and that the laity should be given a proper

### opportunity to take their part in the services.

Therefore resolved, that this Synod put on record its opinion that all the clergy should read their part of the services as thoughtfully and expressively as they are capable of, not unduly hurrying in the parts of the service that are spoken in unison, nor cutting short the responses of the laity.

### MOANED AND IMPLORED HELP FOR OVER HALF AN HOUR.

—The investigation into the C. P. E. wreck here on Monday, continued yesterday, but little evidence of any importance was taken. G. W. Cash, one of the first to reach the scene of the wreck, stated that Lillian Waterman, the dead girl, was alive under the wreckage for over half an hour after the wreck, and that also she was moaning and imploring help, no effort was made to remove the debris and assist her. All the injured are doing well and several are now able to walk around.
