The increase of \$7,252,092 in the estimates under the miscellaneous heading is more than covered by the increase of \$10,000,000 in the vote for old age pensions. This is understood to cover the anticipated application of the old age pension scheme in Quebec, also the intention announced in the speech from the throne of giving pensions to the blind.
