Most Modern Method For Handling Fruit

9 - To - Date Cold Storage Warehouse Opened In Charlottetown. Car Loads Are Arriving Daily.

Nine tenths of the food consumed at the family table, if it is to satisfy the laws of health, taste and purity, must conform to an unbreakable standard. It must be as fresh as the intelligent care of man can insure. Otherwise all the miraculous work of nature is lost and mankind is not receiving to the full the life giving vitamins and body building elements which come from the earth, the air and the sun.

Wherever fruit is grown in the world the imperative necessity of marketing the products of orchards and plantations in a natural state of full flavor and preservation is a problem of never ending scientific research. Giant strides have been made by the growers in this direction and the benefits of their investigations passed along to the wholesaler and the consumer. Stated briefly the objective of the fruit grower has been to transport fruit from the tree to the table, unimpairing its tastiness or its original essential freshness.

Recognizing this cardinal principle Paul A. Murray of Charlottetown, who opens a wholesale fruit and produce house for business in Charlottetown on Wednesday, is introducing sweeping changes in the handling of fruit in this Province. Hitherto fruit has been imported to the Island under refrigeration and placed in common storage with the result that there has been much depreciation in freshness, flavor and appeal, not to speak of the financial loss due to rot and decay.

All of the Paul A. Murray shipments will reach Charlottetown in carloads lots direct from the orchards to the company's warehouse door, where they will be unloaded and placed in specially built refrigeration rooms. These rooms are of insulated construction, lined with cork and cement. Literally the fruit comes from refrigeration to refrigeration.

The deadly enemy of fruit is evaporation because fruit is approximately ninety per cent fluid. Controlled refrigeration of fruit from tree to table prevents all evaporation and thus the consumer will receive his oranges, grapefruit or whatever he purchases as nature intended it should be eaten. As an illustration the handling of oranges from the time picked until arrival in Charlottetown will be explained.

When taken from the trees oranges are first gradually cooled and then go immediately to refrigeration rooms and they receive a sprayed coating of wax. This closes the pores of the orange and prevents much feared evaporation and consequent loss of flavor and vitamins. Wrapped in tissue paper and still in refrigeration because, if exposed to changing temperatures the wax coating would melt and the oranges become dry and tasteless, the fruit is shipped and eventually reaches Charlottetown. At this stage of its journey its continuance under strict care was formerly abandoned, and the process of evaporation commenced. That break in the system is now a thing of the past. The oranges still retaining their wax coating are preserved in Charlottetown by following the guiding principles of the growers themselves, that is by expert and regulated refrigeration.

Paul A. Murray, following out his intention to give the public absolutely fresh fruit is introducing still another new feature. All orders of fruit sent to retailers will be dated and the eventual consumer will know at a glance how long the product he purchases has been removed from refrigeration. The benefits of this new innovation are self-explanatory.

The new company will handle a wide range of fruits and vegetables. Its excellent facilities, outlined in a previous article, provide for the handling of great quantities under the most critical sanitary conditions. Yesterday the company unloaded a carload of Sun-Kist Orchard King Valencia Oranges shipped from California on May 23rd. The bananas will be imported from the West Indies, coming via St. John by fast Canadian Government steamers, the Lady boats. Grapefruit, the king of breakfast foods, grown in California, with a distinctive flavor, will reach here transported and treated as carefully as oranges. From Washington, the company offers also on Wednesday, winceps apples, extra fancy and plums.

Available too, to fruit lovers will be Florida watermelons, Porto Rico pineapples, California lemons and plums, and fresh vegetables of many varieties. For instance tomatoes from Mexico and Bermuda are arriving, carrots from Texas and the West Indies, cabbage from Maryland, sweet potatoes from Tennessee, and a shipment of lettuce, spinach, cucumbers and beets from the hot houses of Ontario.

Every vegetable or fruit goes in to the properly chilled atmosphere at the Paul Murray's warehouse on Prince St., and nothing is left lying around exposed to decomposition. This fact alone is a guarantee of perfect quality. Banana rooms are equipped with electrical heating as well as electrical refrigeration and supplies will be ripened according to the demands of the trade. This will eliminate overripe fruit.

No matter what article the householder purchases from his grocer or dealer, if it is an importation of Paul A. Murray it is one hundred per cent sound leaving the Company's warehouse and it is dated.
