VITAL STATISTICS—Dr. B. C. Keeping, Deputy Minister of Public Health, in the vital statistics report to the City Council at the regular meeting, revealed that there were 46 births in the City during the month of September. During the same period there were 14 deaths and 30 marriages. Mr. W.M. Reardon, Sanitary Officer, in an attached report said that in addition to numerous duties, he had inspected 530 private yards in the month. All were found in a satisfactory condition. He was assisted part time by temporary sanitary officer Peter Walsh.

KINSMEN MEETING—The regular meeting of the Kinsmen Club was held last night at the Charlottetown with Ernest Lord in the chair. The meeting was confined to business for the most part. The chairman spoke briefly on the gracious response of the public to the appeal for magazines for the P.E.I. Highlanders. Final plans were made for Kinsmen Peanut Day postponed from last Saturday due to inclement weather and to be held on this coming Saturday. The proceeds from this sale are in aid of the Children's Milk fund for Britain. Guests present at the meeting included George Chandler and Sgt. Iken Corey, R.A.F. The club is indebted to the latter for his playing and solo part.

POLICE REPORT—The police report for the month of September, supplied by Chief A. Birwhistle at the regular meeting of the City Council, revealed that there were 26 arrested on a charge of being drunk and disorderly. A dozen had been taken into custody for being drunk and disorderly. There was one prosecution and conviction under the Prohibition Act for unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor. This resulted in a fine of \$200, and costs or three months in jail for the accused. There was one conviction under the Criminal Code for failing to stop a motor vehicle after an accident, a fine of \$25, being imposed. There were 13 motor vehicles tagged for contraventions of the traffic regulations. Prohibition fines amounted to \$75 and miscellaneous fines to \$233 during the 30-day period.

TRANS CANADA CONFERENCES

A series of significant Boys' Conferences are being held this Fall across Canada, one in each province under the auspices of the National Council of the Boys' and Girls' Association of Canada. The Conference for Prince Edward Island is to be held in Charlottetown, Oct. 21-Not and is expected to bring together boys and their leaders from all parts of the province. The Conference for Nova Scotia is held at the Hotel Nova Scotia on Oct. 22, and that for New Brunswick in St. John 20-9.

The three Maritime Conferences will be under the direction of Rev. E. R. MacLean of Toronto, the General and Boys' Work Secretary of the Ontario Religious Education Council. The Conferences will open on Friday evening with a session which will feature an address on the theme, "The Boys' and Girls' Association: A Better World." The Conferences will be divided into groups for Leaders, Seniors and Intermediates.

Island men return from conference

Messrs. Walter Goss and Eric McGregor, who represented the Charlottetown Y.M.C.A. at the Maritime Regional Young Men's Conference in Moncton, returned to the city on Monday after spending three days at the first such convention held in the Maritimes since 1938.

The conference got underway on Saturday, October 11th, with delegates from Charlottetown, Fredericton, Halifax, Moncton, Saint John and Sydney Y.M.C.A.'s. At an opening banquet Saturday evening the delegates were welcomed by E. H. Ritey, president of the Board of Directors of the Moncton Y.M.C.A., who then introduced the guest speaker, Magistrate W. E. Lane of the Moncton Police Court. Magistrate Lane spoke on the subject of "Juvenile Delinquency."

Professor N. A. M. MacKenzie, President of University of New Brunswick, was the guest speaker at the supper meeting on Sunday. Professor MacKenzie spoke on the present war. He expressed confidence in the outcome of the struggle being favorable to Britain and her allies. He stressed the fact that groups such as that to which he was speaking should give leadership both by action and example both now and in the period of reconstruction after the war, in order to insure "a secure future, a happy future and a constructive future."

He explained in conclusion that to make this contribution it is necessary to plan ahead and act immediately to prepare for the period after the war has been won.

Morell credit Union holds Annual meeting

The Morell Credit Union held its annual meeting in Morell Hall on Wednesday night, with Mr. Jerome O'Brien presiding. About 200 members were in attendance.

Mr. Jerome O'Brien in delivering his presidential report stated: "The success of the Morell Credit Union in its three years of operation is due to the hard work and applied study of its members. Continue to study and support the work of your officers and we will have many more successful years of operation."

The report of the Treasurer, Mr. Frank Dunn, showed that the assets of the credit union amounted to \$6165, that loans of \$4200 had been made during the year, and that the profits were sufficient to pay a dividend to members and rebate to borrowers 13 per cent of the interest they had paid on loans during the year.

The Supervisory Committee, consisting of Messrs. Louis McGuire, Philip Sinnott and Clusker McCarthy, reported that at the end of the year there were 281 members in the credit union. There were 149 borrowers and the average loan was about \$37.

Mr. William Condon, reporting for the nominating committee moved that George Phelan, serve as director to replace John Cunningham, that William Aylward replace Philip Sinnott on the supervisory committee and that A. B. McAdam be reappointed on the credit committee. There were no other nominations and the elections were unanimous.

In a general discussion of the problems of the credit union Mr. James Jay commented upon the progress of the Morell Credit Union and told of his pride in its standing among the credit unions of the province. The oldest member of the credit union, Mr. George Hooper, now 84 years of age, said a few words of encouragement to the officers. Mr. Walter O'Brien gave some suggestions on the formation of the habits of thrift and spoke of the necessity of saving at this time.


