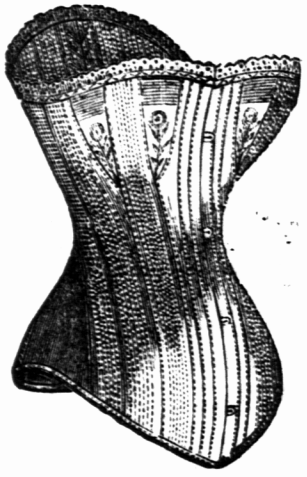

At a meeting of the congregation of Zion church held last night for the purpose of selecting a pastor, it was decided to extend a call to Rev. D. B. McLeod of Orwell.

MR. R. H. MCKENZIE, Flat River, is in the city. Mr. McKenzie received a letter last week from his son Harry, late of the law office of Mr. A. A. McLean. As has already appeared in these columns Master Harry is in a leading law office in London, England prosecuting his studies and is delighted with his work and the surroundings.

THE Stanley arrived at Georgetown at a quarter to ten o'clock yesterday morning—26½ hours from Pictou—bringing two tons of papers by mail and a large quantity of freight, including 600 bbls. flour and 700 bbls. of wheat. The special train from Georgetown arrived in this city at 1.40 p.m. The Stanley will leave Georgetown this morning at 7 o'clock.

A despatch from Boston, on Feb. 21st says:—Miss Laura McPherson, 24 years old who came to Boston a few days ago from Prince Edward Island, and took lodging in a house at 168 Northampton Street was found dead in her room this morning. The body was cold and she had been dead for several hours when found. Her death was due to accident, and she was another victim sacrificed to illuminating gas. There is a gas radiator in her room, and last night, before going to bed, she attached the radiator to the gas burner on the chandelier by a long rubber tube. There was a leak in the tubing where it was attached to the gas burner in the chandelier, and the gas escaped until it filled the room and asphyxiated the young woman. The medical examiner made an investigation of the case, and the body has been taken charge of by friends.

HORATIO NELSON.—Notwithstanding the severe storm last evening the large parlors of the First Methodist Church were comfortably filled by the Junior Endeavorers and their friends to hear Mr. F. T. Higgs on "The Darling Hero of England"—Horatio Nelson. Mr. Higgs in an intensely interesting manner set forth the incidents of Nelson's early life, and the stirring events in his career when he led England's navy to victory. His visit to Quebec, battle of the Nile, when Napoleon faced for the first time an Englishman in the testing hour of battle; the battle of the Baltic and his last and greatest victory were described in a vivid and impressive manner. Mr. Higgs indicated the four conspicuous elements in Nelson's character—honesty, courage, determination, and strong faith in God; and impressed upon the boys that they must cultivate these qualities if they would succeed in the battle of life. Mr. Higgs possesses clear insight, the ability to condense, and to set forth what we gather from history and the lessons suggested in an interesting way. Our young townsman is to be congratulated on his good lecture and the Junior Endeavorers on their pleasant evenings.
