DOCTORS MEET TO CONSIDER SCALE OF FEES.—The medical men of Summerside, Kensington, Emerald, St. Peter's Bay, and Redegue met in Kensington on Friday afternoon, Sept. 22, 1916. The purpose of the meeting was to consider the new scale of medical fees which was adopted at the last regular meeting of the Prince Edward Island Medical Association, a printed copy of which had been sent recently to every member now practicing in this Province. After a careful consideration of the different items from the view-point of the country practitioners rather than the city physician, which necessitated a few changes on account of local conditions, the members present pledged themselves to adopt a common scale of fees with special consideration of the conditions met in country practice. The public will find no very radical changes except in a few instances. The fee for ordinary confinements is fixed at \$10.00, with an extra charge for operative cases. An extra fee of five to \$1.00 will be charged for visits at night. The cost of medicine is not included in any of the fees mentioned whether the physician dispenses his own medicine or not. In order that there may be no misunderstanding, a notice with the approved scale of fees will be posted in the doctor's office and also at the Drugstore.

The sad news came to hand yesterday that Private Louis McMurrer of Royalty, who enlisted for service from here in the Third Canadian Expeditionary Force has died in action. Private McMurrer had been a trooper in the P. E. Island Light Horse, and enlisted for active service in the Canadian Rifles. In July last Private McMurrer was wounded and the news came at that time that he had been recommended for the Distinguished Conduct Medal for conspicuous bravery and self-sacrifice in the fighting at Ypres. The report of that time stated that Private McMurrer had been wounded and was about to be taken to the rear. Seeing a comrade near by and in need of assistance, McMurrer tore the bandages from his own wounds and bandaged up those of his comrade thus saving his life. It is sad news indeed to know that this brave young Prince Edward Islander has fallen in action. To his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. John McMurrer and other members of the family the sympathy of the community goes out. Two other brothers, are also serving the country in this war, Gunner F. L. McMurrer, who left here on No. 11 Field Ammunition Column, and W. A. McMurrer of the 95th Siege Battery. The despatches of yesterday also brought word of more Islanders wounded as follows: Private Kiburn R. Sherrin, of Crapaud, a member of the Canadian Mounted Rifles, who also enlisted from the Prince Edward Island, was shot by John C. McLeish, of Alma, Prince County, and F. McDonald, Elm Ave., Charlottetown, both infantrymen.

NATIVE OF P. E. I.—The Christian Guardian of Toronto says: Rev. Dr. Wadman, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, spent Sunday, Oct. 1st, in St. John. In the morning he preached in the Carleton Church, and in the evening in Centenary. His friends were pleased to see him and to hear him again. He is a native of Prince Edward Island, and was formerly a member of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference. Since then he has been missionary in Japan and Korea. At present he is in charge of the work in the Hawaiian Islands.

WOUNDED IN ACTION.—A telegram was received in this city yesterday saying that Sergt. Major Benjamin F. McDonald had been wounded during the recent Canadian offensive. Sergt. Major McDonald is a son-in-law of Mrs. H. Barr, of this city. He volunteered as a private in the 25th Battalion in Halifax and was promoted to the rank of Sergeant before that battalion left England and more lately was promoted to Sergeant-Major. Mr. McDonald before removing to Canada was Senior Sergt. in the Maine Coast Artillery, U. S. volunteers, and took part in the Cuban war.

SUCCESSFUL CONCERT.—The ladies of Hunter River and vicinity decided to hold a concert and supper in the Hall on Thanksgiving evening, and proceeds to go towards aiding to the comfort of our boys now fighting in the trenches. Though the evening proved very unfavorable, quite a number gathered, and the entertainment was given. It was decided, however, to repeat it on the following evening. This time the hall was well filled, and everyone present was delighted with the proceedings. The following program was rendered: 1. chorus by Twelve Girls; 2. solo, Master Tommy Coleman; 3. reading, Miss Edna Gordon; 4. Play Drill, by Ten Girls; 5. dance, Master Tommy Coleman; 6. reading, Miss Coleman; 7. solo, Mr. Gillies; 8. reading, Miss Gordon; 9. duet, Misses Helen and Ruth Rodgers. Every number of this program was well received, but the audience appeared to be particularly delighted with the reading by Miss Edna Gordon and Miss Coleman. These three young people deserve the special thanks of the committee for coming from Charlottetown on both evenings, responding to encores, and doing all they could towards making the entertainment successful. The sum of \$91 was realized.

The following very interesting letter received by Mrs. P. D. McInnis, of St. Peter's Bay, from her son, Pte. D. F. McInnis, recuperating in hospital after a strenuous experience in France, will be read with interest by his many friends on the Island: No. 1 General Hospital, London, Sept. 24, 1916.

Dear Mother—Here I am in England, with very little the matter with me. I got pretty well shaken up in the big push on the Somme, and had to come out, so they sent me over here for a slight operation. I'm all right now, never felt better in my life, and expect to go back in a few weeks.

Our fellows did fine work on the night of the 15th, when they took Courcellette. I was in with the P. P. C. L. I., and the 42nd Canadian Highlanders, they belong to the 7th Brigade, and we are all proud of the 7th Brigade. It would be impossible to try and describe the battle. It was one continuous roar and crash, men dead and dying all around, but we were advancing, and that made a great difference. The walking wounded were fine, some of them passing us smiling and joking on their way to the dressing station. I was never so proud of being a Canadian as when I heard our attack was successful. I put in five months in the Ypres lines, and it was the toughest of them, especially the first days of June. In the 2nd battle of Ypres, or "2 of June affair," as our fellows call it.

Our fellows went in 87 strong and came out with 21 men, and I am afraid the Somme will claim many more. The night before last Zeppelins paid some attention to London, and dropped bombs within a few minutes of the city. Those who know me will know the bombs weigh 3000 lbs. I know they make a couple of tons of noise. Ypres is a sad looking city; nothing but ruins. The Cloth Hall and Cathedral are beyond repair.

There have been a lot of things happening to me that I couldn't write very strictly. Now mother, I know how lonesome you must be since father died, but cheer up, the war will soon be over and you and I will have some good times together, better than we ever had before, for I didn't know how good a mother I had. Don't worry about me, as I was never better treated in my life, and when we are at the front it is not all fighting. When I get out of the hospital I am going to hunt up the 105th Battalion and see the boys. You don't know how I long to see people from St. Peter's. Guss Down from Forest Hill came over from Boulogne in the same boat as I did. He had a shrapnel wound in the leg, but is getting along fine. Well, this is all for now. Your loving son, 442734, D. F. M.

P. S.—Don't send any parcels, as I had last fall. I'll write as soon as I get a permanent address.

Part of a letter received by Mrs. Michael Brennan from her son Pte. Alexander Brennan, now in England with the 105th. Sept. 12, 1916. Dear Mother—Just a few lines to let you know I am well, and have arrived safe back to camp, got your two last letters, and was glad to hear from home, gain and that all well. I also got the nice parcel and perhaps we did not have a good feed of candy and make the day that it arrived, the socks are fine and everything lovely, but oh the tobacco was such a treat. When the boys would give anything for some Island tobacco, for what I pay John C. McLeish, of Alma, Prince County, and F. McDonald, Elm Ave., Charlottetown, both infantrymen. That you have to pay on the Island.
