## LOCAL AND PROVINCIAL

News and Gossip From Town and Country.

WORKERS.—Remember committee meeting in plebiscite Rooms Y. M. C. A. tonight at 8 o'clock.

A VERY pretty wedding took place at Mr. George Howard's, Highfield, Wednesday evening, the parties being Mr. Walter E. Burke of Charlottetown and Miss M. Alice Howard. They were married at 8 p.m. by Rev. A. D. McLeod. The bride was given away by her father. The bridesmaids were Miss Louisa Howard and Miss Louisa Sellar of Charlottetown. The groom was supported by his brother, Vernon Burke, and Mr. George Ayers, Union Road. The bride and bridesmaids were handsomely attired in white. The room in which the ceremony took place was actually like a conservatory of flowers, directly over where the contracting parties stood during the ceremony being a large bell of flowers. The bride received many beautiful presents. About thirty couples were in attendance. After the marriage supper the newly wedded pair drove to their new home in Charlottetown Royalty.

The development of industries through patented inventions. (Communication from Messrs. Marion & Marion, Solicitors of Patents and Experts, New York Life Building, Montreal.) Prior to January 1st, 1881, 236,136 patents (not including 9,957 patents granted prior to 1836) were issued by the United States. These included all patented inventions exhibited at the Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia, an exposition of which the most striking and important feature was its display of the improvements in industrial arts brought about by American invention, a display which was a revelation to all who visited that exposition and was justly attributed to the stimulus given to invention by the United States Patent system. It was believed by many that the inventions there exhibited represented the highest development possible, that there was no further room for improvement in many of the arts at least. Yet, the effect of this exposition was not, as might have been expected, to discourage invention and to convince inventors that nothing more remained to be done, that the field of invention was exhausted. For three years after this exposition the number of applications for patents received was less each year by fully one thousand than in 1876; but in 1880 the number was nearly one thousand more; in 1881 nearly five thousand more; in 1882 ten thousand more than in 1876 were received. Last year the number received was, by six thousand, more than twice the number received in 1876.

Spot and check velvets, also plain covered with spot veiling is one of the new features of trimming this season, natural wings very large, such as Partridge, Peacock, Guinea Fowl, etc., and Tips are also very much worn.

McPherson, Halifax; Mrs. Robinson, Moncton; Mrs. Rosborough, North Sydney; Corresponding Secy' Miss Boak, Halifax; Rec. Secy' Miss Eva Holmes, Halifax; Treasurer, Mrs. Blackwood Halifax; For. Secy' Mrs. A. G. Troop, Halifax; Y. P. W. Miss McCulloch, Truro; Sec. Supplies Miss Forrest, Halifax; Secy. Miss Band, Miss Davidson, Truro; Auditor Mr. Waddall, Halifax. Board of management, and nominating committees were appointed.

A lively discussion followed on the number of delegates required at the annual meeting. It was decided to leave the number as before.

The President wished auxiliaries to note that delegates be reasonably sure they will attend the annual meeting, before sending in their names.

Session closed with the usual devotional exercises.

The closing session of the annual meeting of the W. F. M. S., was held this afternoon at 2.30, Mrs. D. Currie in the chair. After the usual opening exercises the minutes were read and approved. The usual resolutions of thanks were passed to the ladies of Zion Church for their cordial reception accorded them and to the other ladies of the town for their kind hospitality; to the several railway and steamboat companies for their substantial aid in granting reduced rates to the delegates; to the various newspapers for the generous insertion of the reports and notices of this convention.

A resolution of sympathy to Mrs. Sutherland was also passed and a resolution of sympathy with Mrs. Dr. O'Hara in the illness of her mother.

"God be with you till we meet again" was sung and Mrs. Dodge closed with prayer.

The delegates, their entertainers and the ladies of St. James' church, who so kindly helped in the entertainment were invited to a reception in the basement of the church in the evening at 7.30.

In the evening an informal but very pleasant reception was tendered the delegates by the young people of Zion Church. The room had been prettily decorated for the occasion. After some time passed in social intercourse refreshments were served. The reception gave an opportunity for the delegates who had been very busily engaged during the meetings of the society, to meet each other and the members of Zion congregation in a social way. The occasion was much enjoyed by all. The meeting closed by singing "Blest be the tie that binds," and the benediction pronounced by Rev. Mr. Kirby.
