THE NEWLY ADOPTED ENGLISH RIFLE TO BE USED BY BRITISH ARMY

The New Rifle, Stumpy In Appearance, Being the Outcome of an Idea to Provide all Branches of Our Service With a Small Arm of One Uniform Pattern.

(London Express) Some important and drastic alterations are being made in the Government small-arms factories consequent on the arrangement made by the War Office for the new pattern of rifle, the adoption of which roused considerable comments some months ago.

At Enfield Lock an extensive scheme of reorganization has just been commenced. In the first place, a recent order for 25,000 Lee-Enfield rifles has been cancelled. The newly adopted weapon is called the "Lee-Enfield Modified." Its mechanism, so it is claimed, is much less complex than that of the present Lee-Enfield; it is composed of a smaller number of parts, and is, therefore, turned out at a less cost of time and is stated to possess greater velocity of discharge.

The weapon, exclusively described some months ago in the columns of the Express, elicited some adverse comments. The new rifle, it was stated, was stumpy in appearance, being the outcome of an idea to provide all branches of our service with a small arm of one uniform pattern. It is, in fact, really a compromise between a rifle and a carbine.

It is five inches shorter than the existing rifle, which would certainly suggest that the full effectiveness of the infantry arm is in danger of being sacrificed to the hardly equal advantage of uniformity.

For with a diminished length of barrel the back-sight and fore-sight are brought much closer together, thereby increasing the possible angle of error in aiming and causing a most regrettable loss of accuracy at the longer ranges so common at the present day.

The loss of reach in a bayonet fight, too, should be a consideration. Another novelty about the new weapon is provided by the barrel, which is entirely covered by a wood casing up to about an inch of the muzzle—an improvement which will undoubtedly be fully appreciated.

Some critics have dealt rather severely with the system of sighting. The back-sight, compared with the existing pattern, is somewhat clumsy to look at. The flap, is large, and provides for adjustment up to considerable range without being raised, this only being necessary at extreme distances from the object. Despite appearances, this arrangement is advantageous.

The back-sight is practically the only portion of the barrel of the rifle which emerges from the wooden casing. This so thoroughly envelops the barrel that heat radiation, when in the present pattern is disseminated over the whole exposed length, is likely to concentrate itself at the only outlet to be found—at the back-sight and immediately at the eye of the firer. This is a possible defect which would minimize the accuracy of the arm.

The introduction of a hooded foresight is also open to objection as being unsuited to rough-and-ready conditions of active service.

For loading the carrier system is adopted. In order to prepare the Enfield Lock factory for the manufacture of the new rifle, it is necessary that much of the machinery shall be altered and new machines laid down.

Engineers have this week commenced the work of conversion, but it was stated at Enfield recently that the Government does not intend to start the manufacture of the "modified" arm until about June next.

The same process of reconstruction is understood, being arranged for at the Government small-arms factory, Sparkbrook, Birmingham; at the Small Heath small-arms factory, and at the works of the London Armory Company, Old Ford, E.

Considerable dissatisfaction exists at Enfield Lock that the Government should have chosen the winter for the change. Restrictions of employment in regard to the machine-gun department are anticipated at Enfield and the Vickers-Maxim Company's works at Sheffield.
