Bill Skill Paces Bruins To 5-1 Win Over Rangers

BOSTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—A three-goal scoring performance by Bill Skill paced Boston Bruins to a 5-1 victory over New York Rangers and moved them into a third-place National Hockey League tie with Chicago Black Hawks tonight before a packed 13,800 crowd at the Boston Garden.

Skill broke a 1-1 tie with an unassisted goal late in the second period and ended the game's scoring with less than five minutes to play.

The vastly improved Rangers gained first blood midway through the game, when Mac Colville deflected a scoring shot off one of defenseman Pat Egan's skates, on a play launched by rookie Edgar Snider.

The veteran Bill Cowley, who appears at the top of his game in this, his 11th season, was the only player to collect the 500th point of his major league career. But that was denied him by Chuck Rayner, who played the entire game in the New York net, despite the fact that he suffered a cut over his left eye during the early action.

Moscow Dynamos, Glasgow Rangers Battle To Draw

GLASGOW, Nov. 28 (Reuter)—Moscow Dynamos and Glasgow Rangers battled to a 2-2 draw here today in an international exhibition soccer game featured by rough play and short tempers on both sides.

Ninety thousand spectators jammed Glasgow's Troon Park stadium to see the touring Soviet team meet the best club in Scotland.

Innumerable free kicks, most of them against the Scots, marked the contest. The Rangers produced a rugged brand of football in their effort to succeed where they had failed in their previous two Scottish attack and officials penalized the Rangers often for fouls.

Fisheries Dept. Plans To Expand Field Service

OTTAWA, Nov. 28 (CP)—Canada's Department of Fisheries has been making plans for a considerable expansion of its field service on both coasts and they are under study by Government authorities. It was learned today.

Their effect, it is understood, would be the appointment of an increased number of inspectors and other officials in the Maritime Provinces and British Columbia. Presumably, the civil service preference for veterans would govern the appointments where possible.

Meanwhile, steps already have been taken to put the service on a sound economic basis. The Pacific Coast fisheries patrol service has been augmented by roughly 60-footers, which were obtained from the R.C.A.F. after seeing service in British Columbia waters during the war. They will be used mainly for the enforcement of fisheries regulations in shore waters.

On the Atlantic Coast the Department recently obtained the services of two retired Royal Canadian Navy sweepers from the Navy and they will be put into fisheries protection service.

It is expected to be several months before necessary alterations are completed and the cost of the new service will be about \$100,000. The job that was handled by two vessels before the war, a job she is believed to be quite adequate to handle alone.

Barroom Gunfight Causes One Death

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (AP)—A squalid barroom gunfight involving two robbery suspects and a policeman on vacation started here today, resulting in the death of a New York City's lengthening ledger of post-war crime.

Patrolman Edwin Nye, 40, pretended he was playing shuffleboard as two gunmen entered the bar on a short distance away from his holster.

Police reported as one of the men said: "This is a free zone," Nye drew his gun and fired. Shot for shot, one bandit returned fire while the other sank to the floor. Both were wounded, but managed to flee. One was found dead on the street a short distance away, the other captured later.

The Patrolman, uninjured, was promoted to sergeant and given a commendation for his bravery.

Meanwhile, the Brooklyn slavings "boss" Al (Bummy) Davis and 6-year-old Susan Scanzano appeared near solution.

Mobile, Ala., police said they were looking for a Pompano Beach, Fla., man, Leonard Runkowski, 16, who signed extradition papers for the robbery suspect, but who charges in connection with the pistol slaying of a young school girl in a deserted waterfront lot in Atlantic City.

David Donohue, 17, had signed a statement admitting he and three other youths were in the bar when after an attempt to remove the life, he may be paralyzed for life.

Prairie Provinces Heaviest Borrowers For Farm Improvement

OTTAWA, Nov. 28 (CP)—In eight months' operation a total of \$2,912,223 has been loaned to farmers by chartered banks under the provisions of the Farm Improvement Loan Act. It was disclosed in a report today in the Commons for Thomas Reid (L.-New Westminister) Heaviest lending was in the three Prairie Provinces.

Loans by Provinces included: Quebec, 136,996,209; New Brunswick, 28,428,457; Nova Scotia, \$20,696; Prince Edward Island, 17,622.

Oullen of the Mutual Life was welcomed as a guest, and a special welcome also extended to Mr. Allison MacLean, of Summerside, representative of the Great West Life, who is Dominion vice-president of the Association.

An interesting feature of the meeting was the presentation of a G. I. U. (Chartered) Life Insurance diploma to Mr. D. H. C. by the President and Mr. Gallan.

British Reply To Ottawa Briefs Request For Truce

BATAVIA, Nov. 28 (AP)—British authorities at Bandung, Indonesia, today issued a reply to a request for a truce, issued an ultimatum today that any Indonesian, found in the northern half of the summer capital after noon tomorrow would be shot.

The ultimatum was announced by the Indonesian "governor" of West Java when he appeared at the Homan Hotel where several white flag and asked the British commanders to halt military actions at Bandung.

The situation in Bandung continued tense, with Indonesians keeping up intermittent rifle fire at the Homan Hotel where several hundred civilian internees are quartered.

The disorders imperilled more than 60,000 Allied internees from various parts of Western Java who have been concentrated in the summer capital, awaiting evacuation. Many were moved into the centre of the city last week from outlying camps.

Claims He Was Chained At Night For 20 Years

MONTREAL, Nov. 28 (CP)—An amazing story of how he had escaped after having been chained each night for 20 years to a bed in a farmer's house at Sweetestburg, Que., in the Eastern Townships, was unfolded today by Provincial Police today by Fred Stone, 42, of Ironhill, Que. He said he had ended his alleged captivity when he was sent for care to a hospital.

Stone's story was told to deputy Director Beauregard of the Provincial Police who went to Sweetestburg to hear his testimony.

Stone was found, nearly frozen, in the Bromo Lake district by Knowlton Police who had him transported to a prison hospital at Sweetestburg.

Deputy Director Beauregard subsequently ordered a search of the Eastern Townships municipality, which was disclosed in full cooperation.

Beauregard disclosed that Stone told him that 20 years ago a Sweetestburg family offered to look after him as he was reportedly suffering from a mental condition. Stone said he worked on the farm every day and that at night the family, fearing his mental condition, chained him to a bed in an attic.

Stone said Stone's condition is regarded as serious, while doctors reported that his legs bore marks of chains.

U. S. Steel Workers Vote For Strike

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 28 (AP)—On the basis of incomplete returns from scattered States tonight, steel workers' union leaders in favor of a heavy majority in favor of a walkout to support their demands for a \$2-a-day pay increase.

Partial returns from today's balloting at the mills in the biggest steel strike poll on record, showed 21,338 votes in favor of a strike and 4,636 against.

These returns were mostly from steel areas of Pennsylvania, Maryland and Virginia with scattered results also from California, Illinois, Indiana and North Carolina.

Legion Appeal Re Industrial Disputes

OTTAWA, Nov. 28 (CP)—The Canadian Legion made public today a letter to the public with the current meetings of the co-ordinating committee of the Dominion-Provincial conference and declaring that the unhappy position of veterans during industrial disputes is a problem now causing considerable concern.

J. C. G. Herwig, national Legion secretary, said the letter had gone to Veterans Minister Mackenzie and to the Minister of Labour and all provincial Premiers.

The letter said the position of veterans in securing employment is fast becoming more difficult.

"The employment service has been endeavoring to maintain a preference in referring them to employers. This benefit however, will become less effective unless some controls are maintained. On the other hand, unionized industry has, as yet, been unable to discover a way to permit employers to engage veterans in many fields because of seniority agreements.

"It must be recognized that manpower is fast overtaking the number of jobs available and unemployment in some areas is again a condition that must be dealt with. It measures to give preference fall, and unionized industry remains closed to the veteran without seniority standing, then it seems clear that an undue proportion of veterans will appear among the unemployed, and those most seriously affected will be men who, in their thousands, enlisted from school."

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
