CHOCOLATE SAUCE

3 squares unsweetened chocolate
1 tablespoon butter
1-2 cups sugar
Dash of salt
1-2 cup hot water
1 cup coffee cream
1-2 teaspoon vanilla
Method: Place the chocolate in the top part of a double boiler and melt over hot water. Then add the butter, sugar salt and the water and cook until the sugar is melted. Add the coffee cream gradually. Remove from hot water and cook over direct heat for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat, add the flavaning and beat vigorously for a few minutes. Store in the refrigerator until ready to use.

SLIPCOVERS GIVE BRIGHT, NEW ASPECT

Don't be discouraged if fall housecleaning uncovers unexpected signs of drabness in your parlor chairs. For a little money, even the dullest room can be transformed into one that is gay and livable with a new set of slipcovers.

If they look like a frightening task but even the amateur sewer can copy all the smartest decorator finishes by using modern sewing machine attachments.

Select material that is pre-shrunk, dust-tight and face-proof. Corded edges are simple to do if you use the cording foot. If you decide on a pleated flounce, use the pleater attachment. Use plenty of pins and place them all lengthwise; the little finger presser foot will sew right over them. Remember that pressing and smoothing as you go along will make a smoother product.

ALUMINUM PAINT FOR EXTERIOR SURFACING

Aluminum paint has high resistance to water penetration. It is therefore, an excellent paint for exterior priming or for any other surface where a surface needs such protection. If it is possible within the building budget to have the backs of all clapboards or other wood wall covering painted before erection, it will prolong the life of the outside paint.

SPONGE DESSERT EASY TO PREPARE

A sponge is a quick and easy dessert to prepare and a variation of plain gelatin. Simply fold in the whites of two or three eggs, as you prefer, to your gelatin recipe for four portions. Allow the gelatin to thicken before folding in the egg white. Return to refrigerator until serving time. Garnish with fruit and whipped cream.
