Many attend Short Course Held at Souris

"In building cooperatives we are building a civilization; we are putting a governor on the hard and cruel and relentless operation of modern economic forces. This is the big task of the people." With these words Prof. A. B. MacDonald concluded his address at the Tuesday evening meeting of the short course conducted by the Extension Department of St. Dunstan's University at Souris this week.

Dr. Murphy, Rector of St. Dunstan's University, presided at the evening meeting which was attended by more than 200 people. In his closing remarks, Dr. Murphy told about the six short courses which the University had sponsored during the past two years. These courses have attracted more than 1900 students. The course in Souris, the last to be held in this season, had a registration of 92 on the opening day.

Dr. Murphy lashed out against the industry which is rampant in our society today. It is a condition far different from that which prevailed in his youth, Dr. Murphy stated. In his opinion, however, the credit union and cooperative will bring people to a point where a necessary element of stability in society, he said, Dr. Murphy, cooperation must be based on education. Cooperation is above all a state of mind and must be developed. This is the purpose of the University in offering these short courses.

Dr. Murphy concluded his remarks by stating that the future of the future, after the edginess of the guns have dimmed and the roll of the drum has faded, will be a heading ground for civilization. Cooperation will play a large part in rebuilding our society after the ravages of war.

Prof. A. B. MacDonald, who is recognized all over North America as an authority on the subject of cooperation, delivered an inspiring address. He spoke of the necessity of planning for the things that are to come. By way of illustration Prof. MacDonald told of the increase of mortgage debt on farms and of rural decline generally. The gradual impoverishment of the country districts takes with it the country town. Conditions in the Maritime Provinces are a result of such forces.

Prof. MacDonald then painted a broad picture of economic conditions. He stressed particularly the great concentration of wealth in the hands of a few, while the majority of people remain perpetually poor. The present is the time, in the opinion of Prof. MacDonald, to plan for a future which will ensure peace and security for all.

The old lady, Mrs. MacDonald, is dead, said Prof. MacDonald. Church leaders of all denominations have condemned the iniquities of the present system, he went on to say, and quoted the words of the prophet: "Monopolies in meat packing, automobile, rubber goods, and many other industries were pointed out as examples of injustice in the society of today."

Monopoly leads to price dictatorship and to a domination of economic life. Indebtedness to vested interests may lead to a similar domination on the local scale with consequences no less harmful. "Since political measures and individualistic freedom have not in the past served to effect a reform, let us be open minded and try the cooperative movement," Prof. MacDonald stated.
