PREMIER ROSS ON CORRUPTION.

In a recent speech Premier Ross of Ontario dealt with the charge and the prevalent belief that a long term of power by one political party tends to corruption. He made two principal points in his address: first, that the commonly received opinion, that the Sandfield Macdonald government, the first in Ontario under confederation, only held power four years, yet in that time four of Macdonald's supporters and only one member of the Opposition was unseated by the election courts. Again he claimed that during the long term of Liberal power in Ontario, beginning in 1871 and still going on more Conservatives than Liberals had been unseated by the election courts.

The easy answer to Premier Ross is found in the fact that in its earlier years of power first under Blake and afterward under Mox at the Liberal party in Ontario was comparatively a party of purity. Those high minded statesmen preferred to rule by honest methods. They found in their reputation for integrity a claim to public favor. It is in more recent years and under the baneful influence of a too long lease of power that this "shield of the mighty" has been "vilely cast away." In the recent trials in the election courts four Liberals were unseated while all three petitions against Conservatives were dismissed, and in one case—Centre—Hence—the Conservative member was complimented by the judges. The cold historic facts thus go to confirm the prevalent opinion that a very long term of power tends to deprave the dominant party. It has been so under Conservative rule in Ontario and under Liberal rule in Ontario.

John Morley, the eminent English Liberal statesman and author of the life of Gladstone has accepted an invitation to address the Canadian Club in Toronto about the end of this month. He is 66 years of age.

Now that Hon. George E. Foster has become the candidate for a Toronto constituency the Toronto Globe is after him with a big stick. It calls him The Man with a Past the rejected of New Brunswick, the man who attempted to coerce Manitoba, and the betrayer of his leader a member of the "nest of traitors" who deserted Sir Mackenzie Bowell in the hour of his trouble; and so on. The Globe says Mr. Foster on his part had characterized Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. W. S. Fielding as "cheats and swindlers." The campaign in Toronto will evidently be a hot one.

Under pressure of the impending elections and the united demand of the people of the Northwest Territories for provincial autonomy, Sir Wilfrid Laurier is understood to have promised that one or more new Provinces will be established west of Manitoba next year. The vexed school question will then come to the front again on the demand that the new Provinces shall have a separate school system, like those of Ontario and Quebec. That this demand will be strongly resisted it is needless to say.

John Charlton, for many years the Liberal representative of North Norfolk, Ontario, in the House of Commons, has definitely retired from political life on the ground of ill health. He is 75 years of age. His retirement is greatly to be regretted. Mr. Charlton was one of the able men of his party who did not attain to a cabinet position. He was an earnest advocate of political purity, reciprocity, temperance and for maintaining the sanctity of the Sabbath.

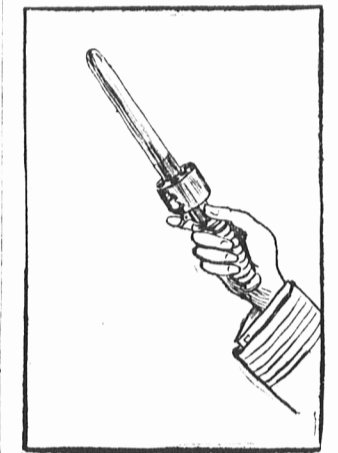

DANGER IN TUNNELS.

The recent accident in The St. Clair tunnel on the Grand Trunk Railway by which six men were suffocated shows the danger attendant upon operating tunnels which dip downward under broad rivers, and which would be a source of danger in the projected tunnel under the Northumberland Straits were it built. Certain poisonous gases are heavier than air and always sink to the bottom. In a tunnel through a mountain, as in the Simplot or St. Gothard, the centre being higher than the ends of the subterranean passage, these gases escape. In the recent accident at Sarnia a train of coal cars broke in two and most of the cars, with the brakemen thereon were left for a time in the bottom of the tunnel. The engine with a volunteer crew was sent to bring out these cars with the result that three men who had first been left in the tunnel and three of the rescuing crew were suffocated.

POLICEMAN'S CLUB AND PISTOL.

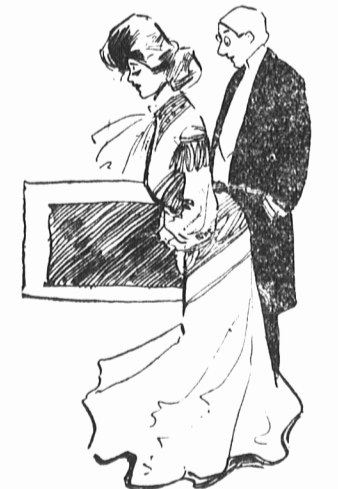

His pistol under these circumstances is as useless as if it were miles away, and for the purpose of answering an emergency of this kind a recent invention combines the club and the pistol in such a manner that they are both available as the exigencies of the occasion demand.

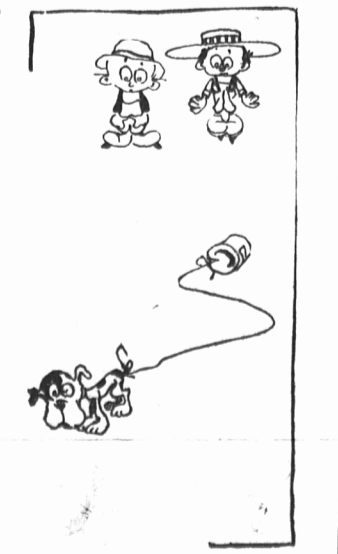
