MacPhee, presided. Two of the ladies reported visiting a home in the woods west of Richmond, and found a man and his wife and three boys living in a small hut made of rough boards without any furniture except a cooking stove and the house not shingled, daylight showing through, and the children practically without clothing. The Society ordered that clothes be obtained at once for the children and further investigation is to be made. The agent, Mr. Vincent J. Harrington, reported he had numerous calls for clothing and foot wear in order that children might be able to attend school, and he had supplied through the Society those actually in the greatest want. He also reports that he had a number of calls for school books and these were supplied. The School Board of the Town, Mr. Harrington also reported that he had the trunk pretty well in hand, as he only had one bad case during the past month. He also reported that some citizens had handed him in some second hand children's clothing, but much more can be used, and Mr. Harrington will call at the homes for same if notified by any citizen. —**ALL QUINTUPLETS GAIN AVOIRDUPOIS**

CALLANDER, Ont., Oct. 10.—Every one of the five Dionne quintuplets gained weight during the week-end. Dr. A. R. Dufos, their physician, announced last night, Marie and Emilie scored the largest gains in weight by becoming 11-2 ounces heavier. Marie is the first of the five daughters of Mrs. Olive Dionne.

The 132-day-old infants are still particular about their feeding and have to be taken in the arms of their nurses or doctor before they will accept their food. Dr. Dufos, however, has declared that "we are going to take that out of them" and he intends to see that they accept their food without being lifted out of their beds.

Marie now weighs six pounds eight ounces and Emilie six pounds 11-2 ounces. Cecile gained one ounce to eight pounds six ounces; Annette 11-4 ounces to eight pounds 13-4 ounces and Yvonne, heaviest of the babies, gained 1-4 to nine pounds eight ounces.

MUST BE DARING FOR NEW DUTIES

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 9.—First woman to be appointed medical examiner by the aeronautic division of the U. S. Department of Commerce, Dr. Emma Klitbridge, arrived here by plane from California, with four women pilots, members of the Women's Air Reserve of Los Angeles.

This organization is the first flying medical unit composed of women in the United States. Sixteen women fliers, six of them nurses, are members of the Reserve. They aim to give medical care in times of disaster or distress—fire, flood or famine—using the advantages of air service. The flight from California was the first cross-country formation flight of U. S. women pilots.

"Any woman pilot," said Dr. Klitbridge, "is eligible for membership in the Reserve. Of course, she has to prove that she is the fearless, daring type of person who is willing to take risks, and do really hard work."

Asked what women she regarded as important in the flying field, Dr. Klitbridge named Amelia Earhart for her spectacular flight of the Atlantic, and Phoebe Fairgrave Omlie, Special Assistant for Air Intelligence, at Washington, D. C.

"From the point of view of technical knowledge Miss Omlie has done more to advance the place of woman in aviation than any other woman in this country," Dr. Klitbridge said.
