## PARTICULARS OF DEATH OF GR. ROBERT MCPHEE

Mr. James McPhee, of the Savoy House, Charlottetown, yesterday received the following letter from Major J. R. Darke, in command of the Heavy Artillery at Sydney, N.S., explaining the death of his son, Gunner Robert McPhee, which occurred at Sydney on Sunday last:—

Sydney Mines, N.S.,  
March 14, 1915.

From Major J. R. Darke,  
O.C. Det. Hy. Artillery,  
To James McPhee,  
Charlottetown.

Dear Sir.—Confirming my telegram of this date to the Rev. Dr. Fullerton, it is my painful duty to inform you of the death of your son, which took place at the North Sydney Hospital at 1 p.m. to-day.

He was apparently in his usual good health until Friday night, when he complained of chills. He went to bed and passed a quiet night. But on my rounds in the morning I found that he was sicker than was at first suspected. I at once telephoned for a medical officer, who ordered his removal to the hospital, which instructions were immediately complied with. Everything possible was done, by both the medical officers and the nurses in the hospital. Shortly after he entered the hospital he became unconscious and remained that way until the end. The cause of death, as given by the doctor, was acute dilatation of the stomach.

All arrangements have been made to have the body embalmed and forwarded from here to-morrow, Monday, evening. The remains will be accompanied by an N.C.O.

The officers and men of this detachment extend their deep sympathy to you in this hour of great bereavement.


