ST. DUNSTAN'S SKATE.—An unusually large crowd attended the skate at St. Dunstan's College last evening, 140 passengers going out by special train from Charlottetown. The programme was of the highest quality, excellently furnished by the band of the League of the Cross Society, under the leadership of Mr. W. J. Brawlers. Refreshments were served during the evening. For the occasion the rink was gaily decorated with patriotic bunting and the College colours. The committee in charge are to be congratulated upon the success of the affair, as everybody pronounced it the most enjoyable skate yet held at this grand old institution.
'THE LAND'—Dr. Andrew McPhail, Editor of the McGill University Journal, has granted to Mr. H. Irving Beers the rights to present his new play, "The Land", in Charlottetown, St. John, Montreal and other cities. "The Land" is a social or domestic problem play and is spoken of by many of the literary reviewers as dramatic criticism as a great dramatic work of high literary value. It is said to be the finest work that this brilliant Islander has turned out. Mr. Beers is in receipt of a letter from Dr. McPhail wishing him much success with the production which will be given later this season.
TEACHERS ADDRESSED.—Tuesday afternoon Mr. Henry Smith, School Trustee, read a paper on the School System of Prince Edward Island, with special references to Teachers' Institute here. President Seaman presided. Besides the teachers a number of others were present. After brief and appropriate remarks by the Chairman, Mr. Smith delivered his most interesting and valuable paper, which dealt with the beginning of our schools about one hundred and fifteen years ago, down to the present time. The names of the old time teachers of our schools, also the disadvantages under which they laboured. Then the opening of schools and the building of the old Central Academy, after the Prince of Wales College. The paper abounded in anecdote, historical reference and gave a splendid picture of how education progressed within the century. At its conclusion eulogistic remarks were made by Superintendent Campbell, Wm. Bradley and F. J. Nash. A cordial vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Smith. Mr. Bradley, formerly vice-principal of Queen's Square School, has for some years past in the West, given a capital account of the educational system and the work and remuneration of teachers there.
PEOPLE'S THEATRE.—Since the opening picture of the series at the People's Theatre, the story of 'Fantomas, the Man in Black,' has been a centre of interest, and has fascinated those who have been following its presentation. Yesterday's installment in four big reels was even more exciting and mystifying than any yet given. It was entitled "The Mysterious Finger Prints," and showed how the detective endeavored to use them to the downfall of the "crook" element in the story. Starting adventures followed in these were portrayed most vividly yesterday in the presentation of the

second chapter. The interior of the Paris sewers, which the outlaws used as a "den" for their stolen goods; the fancy dress ball, the escape from the trunk all added zest to the picture. "The Resurrection of Caleb Worth," a fine drama, was ably acted and excellently staged. Of especial interest was an industrial picture of the Peabody factory, where hundreds of operators are now busily engaged turning out flannel shirts for the soldiers at the front. Mr. Dave Parks delighted the big audience with a fine character song which he rendered in his own inimitable manner. This excellent programme will be shown again to-night.
'THE BETTER MAN'—Large crowds witnessed at the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday "The Better Man," in four parts, the popular dramatic romance by Rev. Cyrus Towns-land Brady, LL. D. The play is the best of the series of big features yet produced at the theatre. The following is a synopsis of the story, which was portrayed admirably, featured by beautiful an appropriate scenic invest-
ture—Mark Stebbing and Lionel Barmore are two young clergymen in a metropolis, both friends, but of distinctly opposite types. Both love the same woman, the beautiful Margaret Wharton, the daughter of a proud and wealthy old capitalist, and a strong supporter of the fashionable church of St. Hilda's. The Bishop of the Diocese has two vacancies for which he must recommend rectors; one of the churches is that of the rich St. Hilda's, the other that of St. Osmund's, the broken and deserted church of the slums. Stebbing chooses the poverty-stricken church of the poor while Barmore is glad to see the beautiful church of St. Hilda's fall to his lot. Barmore and Stebbing confess their love to Margaret on the same day, and she, in doubt as to which is the better man, answers them both evasively. Barmore takes his leave, gallantly declaring he may hope for a definite answer in the future; but Margaret's little coquetry is mistaken by the straightforward Stebbing for a disguised "yes," and he seizes her in his arms.
