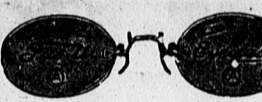

REDUCING COST OF HANDLING GRAIN

OTTAWA, May 7.—With the object of determining whether any reductions can be made in the cost of handling grain, so as to ensure the farmer getting full value for his product, the newly formed grain enquiry commission will investigate every phase of the grain business, from the moment the farmer ships it until it finally reaches its ultimate market. In this matter Justice Hyndman, of Edmonton, the chairman of the committee explained the aims and objects of the commission here last night, having arrived yesterday afternoon from Winnipeg, to complete minor arrangements for the practical operation of the committee. The commission will only meet at central points. No complaint will be ignored even coming from the remotest location. The scope of the committee is very extensive, having powers of a civil court for the subpoena of witnesses, as well as the full powers of a parliamentary investigation, he explained. The duties of the commission embrace the grain trade from the farmer's field to the ocean ports.

SAYS DOMINION HOME RULE IS MISNOMER

DUBLIN, May 7.—A spokesman for the Dail Eireann today declined to throw further light on the Craig-De-Valera meeting that already is known and said that nothing additional would be published as yet. He directed attention to the phrase in the Dail Eireann's first condition for peace was a "united Ireland" with full independence. "Dominion home rule" he termed a misnomer—a view subscribed to by Captain Henry Harrison, Secretary of the Irish Dominion League, which is to be submitted to the Government. The phrase "Dominion home rule" had been carefully excluded in favor of "a full Dominion status" which he added, was quite another thing.

A Big Crop Of Foxes This Year

The breeding season for Silver Foxes in captivity is about over, and the reports from every section go to indicate that this year the average production will be far ahead of any former year. The season has been most propitious in that there have been very few sections in which severe storms or bad weather was experienced after the litters were born, which generally causes more or less mortality among the young pups.

Some reports from certain localities both in this country and Canada show an average of from 100 to 150 per cent increase. This means that the fur farmer will this year make very handsome profits. While the prices of all furs declined considerably from the high figures of last year, still in the matter of Silver Foxes there has been very little falling off.

The reason of this is because Silver Fox is primarily a high class and luxurious article, and only the wealthy class can afford to wear it; therefore this class is always willing to pay the price, providing they obtain the article they want. Furs are an absolute necessity to the women of this as well as other countries. Did you ever notice on the streets of any city, both in winter and summer that a great majority of the women you meet wear furs and did you ever stop to think of the many millions of animals that must be killed each year to supply the demand. This demand has lately become so great that the supply in the world is rapidly diminishing; therefore there is a very great opportunity for the fur farmer. Our government and the Fur Merchants of this country are now fully awake to the growing scarcity of wild fur bearing animals, and are doing all in their power to encourage the fur farmer. Relative to the Silver Fox industry, a report lately issued by the Bureau of Biological Survey at Washington, stated that over 4200 Silver Black Foxes in captivity had been registered with them but that it was estimated that between 8000 and 9000 were in reality on the ranches. In Canada it is estimated that between 25,000 and 30,000 is the number. This in itself is not an extra large number, and when it is considered that the ranches are now virtually the only source of supply it can be seen that where the whole world has to be supplied, Silver Fox at least will not be a common article. The wealthy class of Americans alone could easily absorb three times this number of pelts, and it would hardly create a fraction of a dollars difference in the price.

Owing to the publicity that has been given to this industry, and the importance attached to the fact that high grade animals pay the greatest profit, the new ranches that have been established this last season generally contain a higher quality of stock than was formerly the case. As regards the price of breeding animals this season, I look for very little change from the figures of last year. Good quality foxes are always in demand, and always bring a good figure. Farmers in general throughout the country are looking towards fur farming to a far greater extent at present than formerly. They realize that a pair of foxes added to the live stock of a farm means a big added income, and as almost any bit of land that cannot be used for any other purpose can be utilized for a fox ranch, that it pays to take up Fur Farming.

More attention is also being paid this season to the breeding of other and less expensive Fur bearers than Silver Foxes as in all parts of the country, Skunk, Mink, Marten, Fisher and even Muskrat are being raised in captivity. I am constantly being asked all manner of questions regarding the industry by new people who are becoming interested, and hundreds who are making large profits and are making large profits at it have done so through my advice. 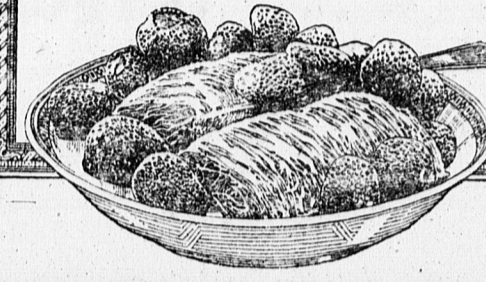

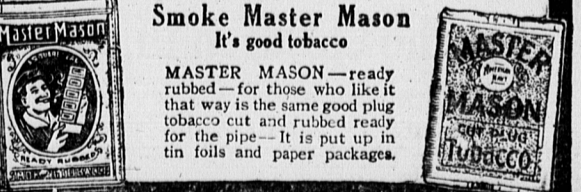
