

S' Side Team Ties One, Wins One In Exhibition Week-End Ball Games

Charles 7 To 5 Favorite In Bout With Walcott

CHICAGO, June 19 — (AP) — For the first time in 12 years, a heavyweight championship bout will be fought Wednesday night with Joe Louis, the retired Brown Bomber, outside the ring.

The 15-round Comiskey Park title scrap, which Ezzard Charles and Jersey Joe Walcott will fight, is not a clear-cut world heavyweight crown at stake, and Chicago has responded lethargically to the match which Louis—now director of the International Boxing Club sponsoring the bout—has dictated will be for his vacant title.

In the face of widespread reports that advance ticket sales were dawdling under the \$100,000 mark, the I. B. C. Saturday released a statement that between \$250,000 and \$300,000 worth of tickets have been sold.

Charles has been established an early favorite at 7 to 5.

The bet makers apparently are riding with the youth of the 27-year-old Cincinnati and overlooking the performance of Walcott in two meetings with Louis.

Wednesday night's bout lacks the blessing as a world title affair by the New York State Athletic Commission, which claims the N. B. A. had no business allowing Louis to rule that his abdicated crown will be un for grabs between Walcott and Charles.

Walcott who has been fighting professionally since 1939, and Charles, a sudden graduate from the light-heavy ranks, will evenly divide 50 per cent of the net take, including television and radio rights.

Joe Louis successfully defended his heavyweight championship nine years ago tonight by knocking out Arturo Godoy, Chilean challenger at New York. The end came in the eighth round of a scheduled 15-round bout. It was the Brown Bomber's 11th successful defence of the title he won in 1937.

One-Armed Rifle Shot One of Best At Meet Here

Major C.F. Kennedy, Truro, a two-time Bisley shot, showed Saturday that he had lost none of his keenness on the range when he shared runner-up position with three others in the Inter-Maritime rifle shoot.

He, along with team-mate H.H. Morse, scored a 89, two points lower than the score registered by Major A.P. Gormley, also a former Bisley shot, Police Chief J.D. O'Connell, noted pistol shot, and Capt. H.A. Fowler of the New Brunswick team also registered 89's.

Major Kennedy's shooting was the more remarkable in that he fires and handles his rifle with only one arm and the use of a rifle rest.

One of Canada's expert marksmen and most promising shots, Major Kennedy lost his right arm in the fighting in Normandy. He is well known here having commanded "D" Company of the North Nova Scotia Highlanders of Canada's 3rd Division.

GLACE BAY, N.S., June 19 — (CP) — Canadian middleweight champion George Ross of West Bay Road, N.S., will be a slight favorite to defeat Joe Pyle of New Waterford, N.S., in their 10-round non-title bout here tomorrow night.

It will be the third meeting between the Cape Bretoners. Ross won a 10-round decision here last year and scored a three-round K.O. in a title defence at Halifax in January.

The champ, who will have about a four-pound advantage weighing in at 152 or 153, is undefeated in 37 bouts. His last fight was at Halifax in May when he successfully defended his title with a 12-round unanimous decision over Pete Zaduk of Guelph, Ont. Pyle earned a third shot at Ross with an impressive 10-round victory over Zaduk here late last month.


