Canned Salmon Imports by Great Britain

Canned salmon imports by the United Kingdom from Canada in March amounted to only 112 pounds. The imports during the first three months of 1933 were as follows in cwt's, the figures in brackets being those of a year ago: Soviet Russia 87,747 (18,776), United States 61,352 (18,687), Canada 18,958 (61,252), Total 171,581 (117,219).

—ADDRESSES HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS—Provincial Fire Marshall C. A. Beer, delivered an address to the pupils of Summerside Tuesday morning in connection with "Fire Prevention." His address was sponsored by the Fire Department in connection with the essay contest they are conducting among the young folks. The necessity for the proper teaching of "Fire Prevention" was emphasized by Mr. Beer when he informed his hearers that the per capita loss of Prince Edward Island amounts annually to \$200. The percentage of these fires which have been due to carelessness was nearly 75 per cent and if this per capita loss was not materially reduced in the very near future a raise in our fire insurance rates was certain. During the course of his remarks Mr. Beer warmly complimented the Summerside Fire Department on pioneering this important work on Prince Edward Island and expressed a belief that the results would be far reaching. Mr. Beer was accompanied by Chief McNeill and L. R. Crue of the Summerside Fire Department.

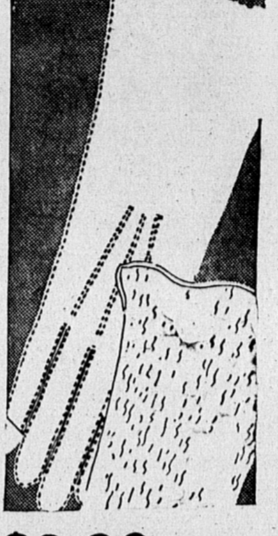

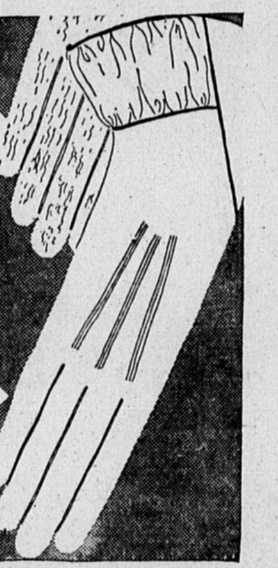
