HUGE CROWD WITNESS SECOND DAY'S RACING

Packed Grandstands See Close Finishes In Every Class Of Fine Card

Millie Kalmuck, Making Second Start In As Many Days, Wins Third Heat Of 2:22 Mixed From Aliset — Peter Onward, Anne Worthy And Sir Welland Other Winners.

Rain or darkened skies until ten o'clock yesterday morning seemed to preclude the possibility of racing, but gradually towards noon the skies brightened and at twelve o'clock Old Sol was shining brightly. He seemed undecided two or three times between that and one o'clock, but finally concluded to place no obstacles in the way of an afternoon's enjoyment for what is believed a record breaking crowd for any day of our Provincial Fair. Every available inch of space was occupied on Grand Stand, bleachers and every other vantage point, while the main grounds and Main Building were also filled.

The Honorable Charles Dunning, Minister of Finance, arrived at a quarter of twelve, accompanied by Premier Thane Campbell and others. He was conducted by Vice-President Honorable T. W. L. Prowse to the Judges Stand, where he was introduced to the audience by the President, Colonel MacKinnon. Mr. Dunning spoke briefly, vouching his pleasure at being able to spend an afternoon at the Provincial Fair, and complimented the management on the grounds, buildings and arrangements made. He said he had not come there to make a speech, nor did he people to hear him make one. He was there just to spend a pleasant afternoon in the same as others. He was warmly applauded. The highlights of the afternoon's racing were the win of Anne Worthy in the Three-Year-Old Futurity in handline finishes with Major Bowes second in the first and third heats and Nita Volo in the second heat. In the first heat before the horses had reached the quarter pole there was a mix-up in which two or three horses made breaks and the sulky of Fairy Waltz broke down. Driver Arbing was unseated and the mare started away on the run. The shaft of the sulky stuck in the ground and Fairy made a complete somersault. Spectators rushed on the track and in a few minutes had her up and around, apparently none the worse for the fall. Driver Arbing was also unseated.

Peter Onward, the good pacer owned by George Mathieu of Campbellton, N.B., was 1-1-1 in the 2:17 Trot and Pace in which a field of ten pacers took the work. In the first heat McElwyn the Great and Trixie Volo made it a hot battle to the wire and in the second they reversed their positions and were again the contenders. Quaker Girl that had been nowhere the first two heats, was a pacing machine the third and came from seventh position to finish a jump second, beating out Trixie Volo and McElwyn the Great.

Budge Far From His Best Form - Ninth Inning Homer By DiMaggio Gives Yankees -6 Victory Over Senators

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 18.—The slump into which Don Budge, the world's greatest amateur tennis player slipped after his brilliant Davis Cup performance reached an alarming depth today when the lean red-haired Californian barely succeeded in reaching the quarter-finals of the historic Newport Casino tourney.

Budge managed to gain the round of eight by faltering along to a 1-6, 11-9, 6-4, 6-4 victory over stubby Frank Guernsey, Jr., of Orlando, Fla.

Frank Parker, Bryan (Bitsy) Grant and Gene Mako, Budge's doubles partners, were the other American Davis Cuppers to enter the round of eight. Advancing with them were Jiro Yamagishi, the Japanese champion, his countryman, Fumituro Nakano; Bobby Grant of Los Angeles, 19-year-old Californian sensation, and John McDiarmid of Princeton.

McDiarmid won the right to meet Budge tomorrow by coming from behind to defeat Yvon Petra of France 3-6, 6-1, 6-2, 6-1.

Grant ousted Roger Joe Hunt of Los Angeles, 6-3, 6-6, 6-3, 6-4. That triumph moved the mighty Atlanta Sabito into the bracket. Yamagishi gained when he eliminated the sixth-seeded John Van Ryn, Austin, Tex., 7-5, 6-2, 6-1.

Parker, who overwhelmed Wayne Sabin of Los Angeles, 6-0, 6-2, 6-2, found Nakano blocking his path to the semi-finals. The latter ran Owen Anderson of Los Angeles into the ground during the most exciting match of the day. The California youngster's terrific exertions in the sultry heat took so much out of him that he was forced to default when his treacherous opponent gained a two-love lead in the fifth set.

Mako was decidedly impressive in his first match, when he defeated the British-born Charles E. Hare, top seeded foreign entry, 6-1, 6-4, 9-7, and young Riggs went down in his Los Angeles townsmanship, George Toley, 6-3, 6-2, 6-3.

A 16-hit assault, including five homers, a triple and Harland Clift's 22nd home run of the season, gave the Browns an 11-6 nightcap victory over the Indians.

Since the Athletics played only one game, the Browns moved back into seventh place by four percentage points, 324 to 320.
