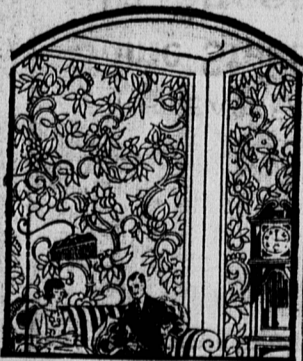

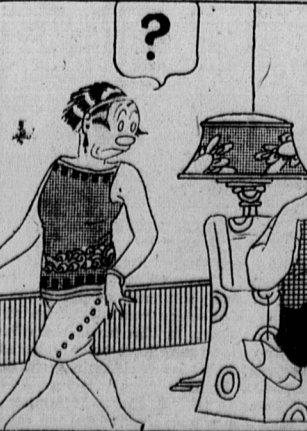
MONTHLY MEETINGS OF THE WOMEN'S INSTITUTES

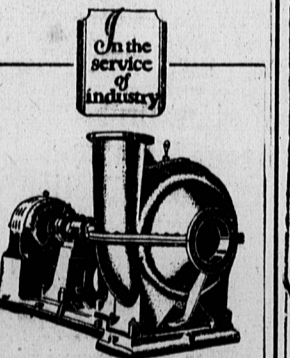

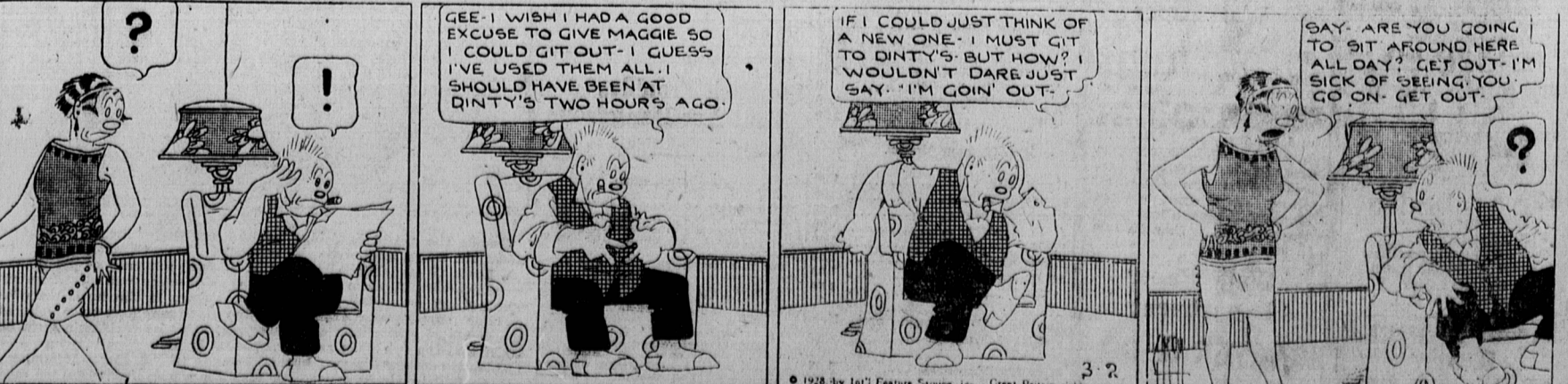
