EDMONTON, July 12.—Liberals and Farmers today lined up their official forces in preparation for elections in Alberta Monday next of new Legislature. Tonight there are 159 candidates in the field of which 61 are supporters of the Stewart Government, 48 of United Farmers of Alberta. There are 14 Conservatives and 15 Labor candidates, 19 who are called Independents and 2 Socialists.

USE GAS MASKS ON OLD BATTLEFIELD

OSTEND, Belgium, July 12.—An enormous depot of ammunition left by the Germans in Houthoulst forest on the old Flanders front, is threatened by a fire in the forest and as a part of the ammunition consists of poison gas shells, gas masks are being distributed to the peasants in the surrounding villages. The fire is spreading rapidly owing to the protracted drought toward the centre of the forest, where the depot is located and the military authorities considered the distribution of the masks as a precaution against an explosion releasing the deadly gas.

John D. Rockefeller Has Health at 82

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., July 12.—Looking the picture of health John D. Rockefeller, today greeted the members of Goldman's Band who visited his estate to help celebrate his 82nd birthday with wish that they might all live to his age.

"Boys I hope you will all live to be as old as I am," said Mr. Rockefeller, "and that you will feel as well as I do now. I have no aches no pains and enjoy my food."

Mr. Rockefeller wore light grey clothes and tan shoes and did not appear to mind the heat. He insisted on shaking hands with every member of the band.

During the two-hour band concert which followed Mr. Rockefeller requested that a melody of Southern melodies, including "Swanee River," "Old Black Joe," "My Old Kentucky Home," and others, be played. He applauded enthusiastically.

A huge birthday cake surmounted by eight large candles, each representing ten years, and two small ones, with the figure of a golfer in the centre, was cut by the oil magnate after the concert.

Replying to congratulations, Mr. Rockefeller declared:

"You know people are learning how and what to eat, and it won't be long before doctors will tell us how to prolong life by many years. Why, I have a friend who is 97 years old, and he goes down to his bank in New York three times a week."

Einstein's View of U. S.

BERLIN, July 12.—Professor Albert Einstein, upon his return from the United States to-day, had something to say on the "exaggerated enthusiasm" which he declares was shown him in America. The famous discoverer of the theory of relativity, which still remains more than relatively incomprehensible to ordinary mortal minds, said:

"This exaggerated enthusiasm for me and my work struck me as being a genuinely and peculiarly American phenomenon. If I understood it right, it was due largely to the fact that the people over there are tremendously bored, far more so than is the case with us."

Professor Einstein, in an interview to-day in the Rotterdam Courant, is quoted as saying that there is little to interest people in America and save them from general boredom. "Of course," says the scientist, "New York, Boston, Chicago and other big cities have their theatres and concerts, but otherwise what? There are cities with a million population, little cities suffering from terrible poverty—poverty of intellectual things."

"Something like the theory of relativity, for instance, is given them with which they can play. They enthuse, they become excited, they argue and discuss with tremendous intensity."

"Did it make a ridiculous impression upon me to observe their excitement over a theory of which they certainly understood nothing? In truth, I found it comic. But at the same time, it was interesting to watch them in their play."

"I firmly believe that it was the very mysteriousness of the idea which they could not grasp that enchanted them."

World on Eve Of Epochal Events

LONDON, July 12.—The world is on the eve of one of the most epochal events in history. This is the universal verdict of newspapers and statesmen here following President Harding's offer and British Government's acceptance in connection with holding a Conference for the discussion of disarmament and Pacific problems. The scene in the House of Commons this afternoon when Premier Lloyd George announced Great Britain's hearty acquiescence in the proposal was a memorable one. The British Premier spoke to a hushed and crowded Chamber and when he declared that the Government welcomed such a move and would do its utmost to make it a success, there was a crash of cheering from all quarters which in the opinion of old journalists in the Press Gallery was never equalled since the announcement of the Armistice with Germany.

Hon. Lloyd George spoke with an earnestness worthy the momentous subject with which he had to deal and the emphasis which he placed upon the declaration that if a conference failed it would not be because the British Empire withheld its support, left no doubt in the minds of the members of the House as to the Government's sincerity.

Zeps to Fly Between New York and Paris

PARIS, July 12.—The dream of travelling from Paris to New York by air may be realized before the end of 1922 by the use of Zeppelins on which the French Government has obtained a patent.

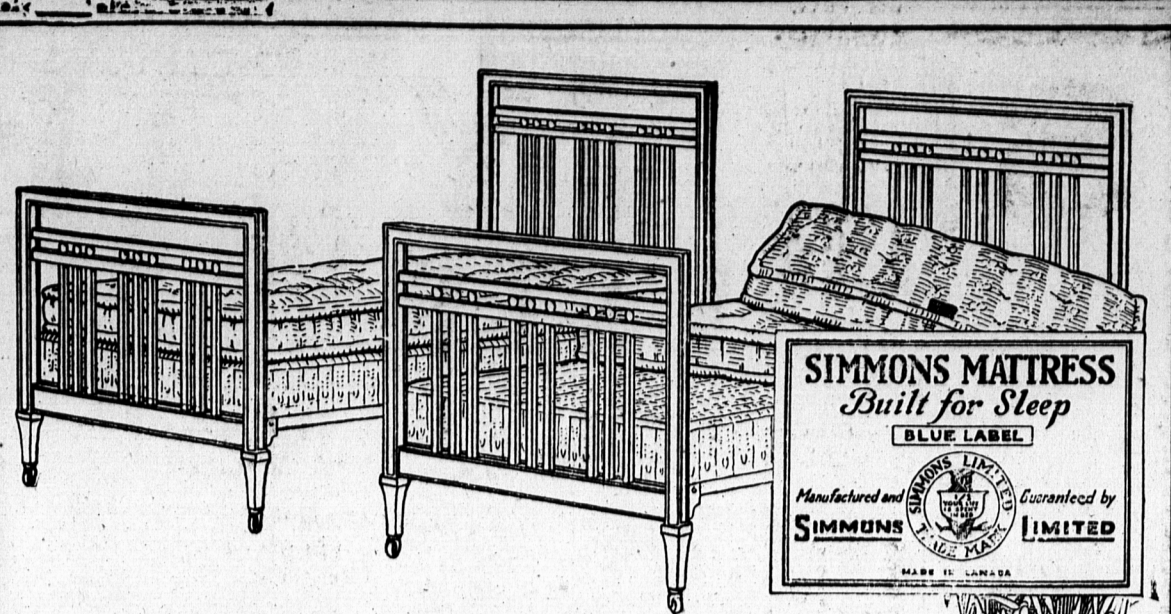
The first commercial Zeppelin delivered here was the Nordstern. It has been rechristened the Dixmude.

This airship will be used first to inaugurate an air line from Marseilles to Algiers in August, carrying on each trip 30 passengers and 5,000 pounds of baggage. The prices will be the same as for first-class saloon passage by ship.

If this line proves a success the French Government will take steps to develop a world-wide Zeppelin passenger service, including Algiers to Morocco and Senegal, Paris to New York, Paris to Rio de Janeiro. Rigid Zeppelins will be used with gas capacity of 150,000 to 375,000 cubic feet.

Western Harvest To Start August 1st

WINNIPEG, July 12.—With the crop situation promising the best in any year at this date with the exception of 1913 wheat, harvesting in Western Canada should commence about the first week in August and be fairly general a week later, says the States Weekly report issued by the Canadian Pacific Railway here today.

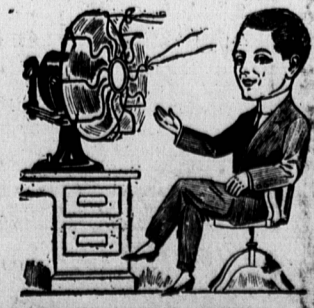
