VICTIM OF TERRORISTS IN CHINA
Friends of the anti-alcohol movement in China, especially those who know of the work being done there by Mrs. Herman C. E. Liu, national general secretary of the women's Christian Temperance Union of China, will be saddened by the news of the assassination of her husband, Dr. Liu, who was shot down on April 7 in his home city of Shanghai, by three "terrorists." Dr. Liu was president of Shanghai University, and had been regarded as an outstanding patriot.

A letter written by Mrs. Liu to W.C.T.U. friends in this country, not long before the death of her husband, outlined the work which was being carried on by that temperance organization even in the midst of war conditions in China. Since there are approximately half a million refugees from various sections of the country in China, Mrs. Liu has headed a movement to teach these refugees the effects of alcohol and opium, and has been organizing an international Branch of the W.C.T.U. among the hundreds of missionaries who were compelled to leave the invaded territory, so as to secure their cooperation when they return to their mission fields.
