Rangers Edge Sydney In Close Game

Third Period Goal By Hermie Gruhn Gives Regina 5-4 Decision

REGINA, April 27—(CP)—Sparked by their youngsters, Regina Rangers edged out Sydney Millionaires 5-4 here Saturday night in the fourth game of the best-of-five series for the Canadian senior hockey championship.

Three 19-year-old forwards fired four goals for the Western Canada champions—Grant Warwick getting two, Scotty Cameron and Frank Mario one each—as Rangers fought desperately to give the West its first win in Allan Cup Finals in two years.

Hermie Gruhn was the other scorer for Regina, flipping the puck into the net from just outside the crease early in the third period for the winning goal of the game. Steve Latoski, Johnny McCreedy and Bud Snell and Grant Hall counted for Sydney.

Millionaires, needing only a tie to win the Cup after winning the first game 8-6, the second 8-3 and getting a 1-1 tie in the third staged a 17-minute powerplay after Gruhn counted in the third and Coach Bill Gill pulled off his goalkeeper in the last minute in an effort to get the tying goal. The fifth game will be played in Regina Tuesday and Millionaires still need only a tie to keep the Allan Cup in the East, where Kirkland Lake Blue Devils took it last year.

Kowelnak Electrifies Crowd Dick Kowelnak, Sydney's lightweight centre, electrified the crowd of about 5,000 with the most sensational play of the game while Millionaires were playing without a goalie late in the third.

A clearing shot from the Regina defence area was heading for the open Sydney net. Kowelnak, whose left wrist is in a cast and will be re-broken and set again after the series, raced after it. He knew in saving he could crash at high speed into the goal posts. But Dick swept in and scooped the puck away from the goalmouth just as it hit the crease. Luckily he only bruised his right shoulder.

Rangers Take Early Lead

Regina went ahead 3-0 within four minutes of the first period when Warwick scored on a powerplay, with Hall in the penalty box, and Mario added another on a lone rush while the sides were even.

Millionaires rallied to tie the count with two goals within 30 seconds just after the halfway mark. Latoski worked in close to beat Jim Henry with a screened shot. Then Henry looked bad on McCreedy's shot that went through his legs from 30 feet out. Warwick put Rangers ahead again with a backhand shot from just outside the crease at 16:23, with Bobby Walton of Millionaires in the penalty box and Cameron made it 4-2 for Regina two minutes later when he flipped the puck into the net from a few feet out after taking a pass from Mario.

Snell and Hall Tie Score

Sydney dominated play for most of the second period as Millionaires staged five-man ganging attacks. With Al Kunkel off midway through the second period, Snell got the puck behind the Regina net and shoved the puck as he came around. Henry failed to get hold of it and the puck wobbled across the line.

Two minutes later Hall batted the puck into the Regina net from 10 feet out after another scramble. The sides were even three minutes after the third began when Bush shot from near the line during a Regina powerplay and Gruhn, parked near the crease, flipped the rebound behind Bill Dickie.

Henry Performs Brilliantly

Henry robbed the Millionaires time and again during the next 17 minutes. Sydney did everything but score for the remainder of the game.

With two minutes to go Johnny Kennedy of Regina and Latoski were given major penalties for fighting and soon after the Sydney net minder was yanked and Millionaires sent five men up the ice. Rangers gave everything they had to stop the Millionaires' attack for the remaining minute and 14 seconds.

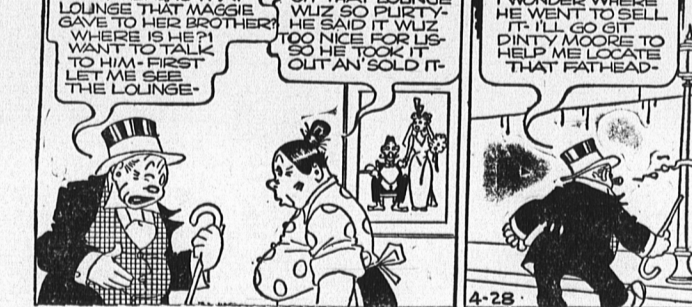

Dime-novel Ending Gives

Winnipeg Rangers 2-1 Lead In Memorial Cup Final

TORONTO, April 27—(CP)—Winnipeg Rangers, fashioning a dime-novel ending to a million-dollar game, defeated Montreal 6-4 here Saturday night to take a two-to-one lead in their best-of-five game series for the Canadian junior hockey title and the Memorial Cup.

The thrill-a-minute contest had its climax for close to 9,000 fans when Lou Medynski, playing despite the fact a severe head gash suffered some weeks ago was not healed completely, scored the winning goal with less than a minute and a half to go.

Medynski's pay-off goal came on a passing play with Bob Ballance and was fired while Royals were resting their main defence star, Bill Southwick, due to the indications that the game would go into overtime. The Westerners added another goal by Sammy Fabro in the last half-minute on a break-away.

The teams resume their rivalry tomorrow night in the fourth contest at Montreal while the fifth game, if necessary, will be played on Toronto ice. Rangers opened the series here last Monday night with a 4-2 victory while Royals surged back to win the second game 5-3 Thursday night in Montreal.

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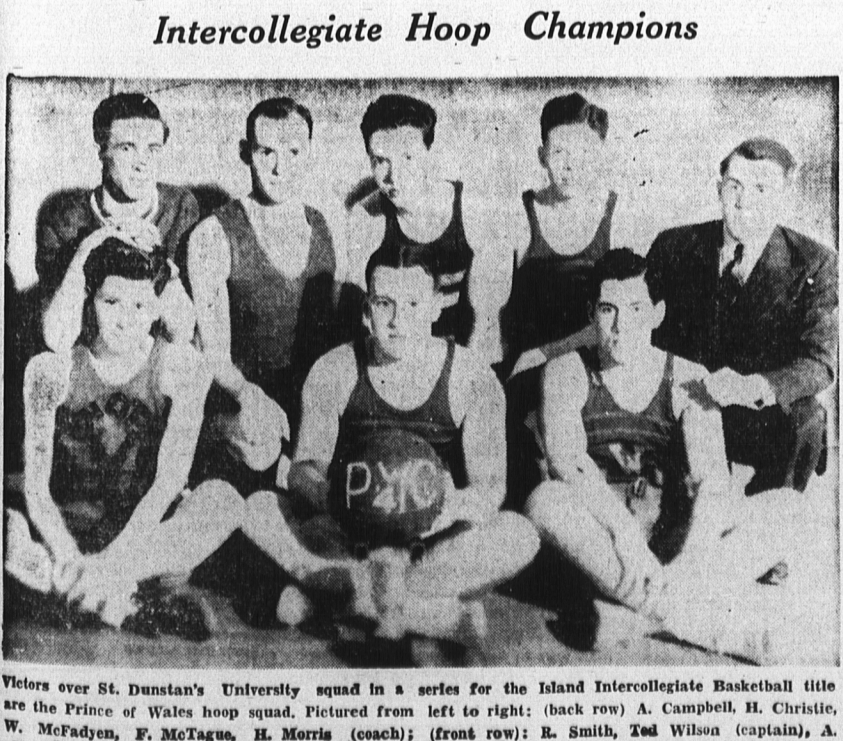
