TO CHANGE LIQUOR ACT. - In a province-wide drive to urge the abolition of the present system of liquor dispensing under the Liquor Act, and substitute Government control, the Alberta Moderation League has put out a force of canvassers obtaining signatures to a petition to present to the Legislature. The Legislature to repeal the present Liquor Act and institute in its place a similar system to that voted for by the people of British Columbia, providing for Government vendors to sell the liquor under rigid regulations. They ask that the system of dispensing by physicians' prescription and drug stores be entirely abolished and that the Government itself handle all phases of the traffic.
