GOVT ESTIMATES READY FOR SESSION

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 1.—The Board Cabinet wound up the year 1911 with a display of industry which has put all previous exploits in the shade. All week the ministers have been working early and late. The climax came on Friday and Saturday when an almost perpetual session of the Privy Council was held, the midnight seeing the termination of their labors.

On Friday the Cabinet sat without a break from eleven in the morning until midnight. Sandwiches and tea at both noon and six o'clock were served on the famous round table. Saturday morning the ministers were down at their offices early and went through their correspondence at a pace which broke the limit. At eleven o'clock they were back in the Privy Council chamber. Lunch was again served. At six, the ministers, stepped across to the Rideau Club, but were back at work again before eight and labored until nearly midnight.

Incidentally the ministers have spent more time over the estimates than they have been given for years. Under the Laurier regime it was a case of "Hurray, boys, what do you want?" and public buildings, armories, break-waters, and docks were scattered indiscriminately, provided the constituency voted right. Great care has been spent this year in making up the estimates and every appropriation has been asked for had to be accompanied by elaborate explanations of the needs of the case.

An amendment to the Gold and Silver Marks Act will likely be introduced shortly after Parliament re-assembles. The present Act has been found of doubtful value in what members of the trade, both manufacturer-

COST OF LIVING ON THE INCREASE

OTTAWA, Jan. 1.—The cost of living throughout the Dominion, as indicated by wholesale and retail prices, has taken a considerable rise during the past year. This interesting fact to the consumers of Canada is indicated by statistics gathered by the Labor Department. The department's index number of wholesale prices stood at 130.8 for November, as compared with 130.5 in the preceding month, and 122 in the corresponding month of last year.

The groups which show an increase for November of this year as compared with November of last are as follows: Grains and fodders, from 123.9 to 165.2; dairy produce, from 148.2 to 149.3; miscellaneous foods, from 112.1 to 125.5; hides, leathers and boots, from 134 to 141.4; metals, from 107.7 to 116.1; implements, from 105.1 to 106.1; lumber, from 161.8 to 155.2; house furnishings, from 107.4 to 111.1; liquors and tobaccos, from 117.1 to 122; sundries, from 108.8 to 110.8. Average, November of this year, 130.5; November of last year, 122.

The problem of the steady increase in the cost of living during the past few years, which has borne most heavily on the laboring and salary-earning classes, is one of the vital elements which must enter into the deliberations of the Tariff Commission to be established during the present session of Parliament. In view of the higher prices for nearly all the general commodities entering into the cost of living, it is safe to say that tariff will not prove popular with the great majority of the consuming classes in Canada.
