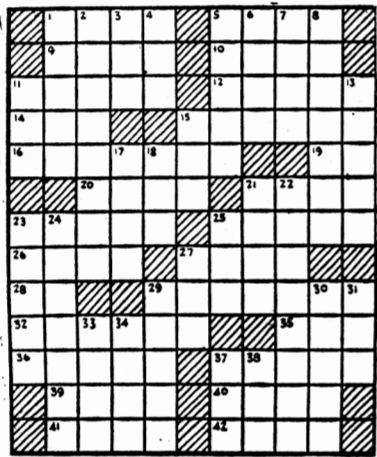

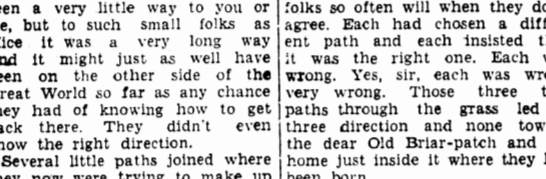

#### Good Defense — But From The Wrong Side

The defenders were correct, in today's deal, in assuming that an early lead of trumps was vital, but the wrong defender made that lead!

**South dealer.**  
Both sides vulnerable.  
North-South 60 on 42

♠ J 8  
♥ 10 7 6 4 2  
♦ 9 8 5 3  
♣ Q 10 5  
K 9 2  
K 7 6 4  
A 6 4 3  
A 5  
A J 10 9 8 2

**The bidding:**  
South West North East  
1♦ Pass Pass Pass  
2♦ Pass Pass Pass

East-West had considerable strength, but neither could well afford, vulnerable, to enter the auction. Moreover, they would not have had to "compete" in they had defended properly!

West opened the heart king. South won and immediately led a low spade toward dummy. West, probably fearing that he might lose his spade trick, put up the queen, and then, to keep dummy from ruffing a spade, shifted to a trump. This necessary shift trapped East's trump queen and declared easily collected five trump tricks and the other three aces. The fulfilled contract on the 60 score gave him the rubber.

All defense "evaporated" when West put up his spade queen! He certainly should have given more thought to that play! Surely, declarer did not have the ace and king of spades—he would have cashed them and ruffed a spade with dummy's singleton trump—and therefore West would risk nothing by ducking. If West had let his partner win the first spade lead, East naturally would have shifted to a low trump and with this lead coming through declarer, the latter would have to give up not one, but two trump tricks! If he put up the diamond ace on East's lead, the defenders would have two natural trump tricks; if declarer finessed on the first diamond from East, West would win and East would later get his queen.

It may be worth saying, as a general rule, that the average defender has too much fear of losing the immediate trick, and too little fear of maneuvering his own side into a losing position.

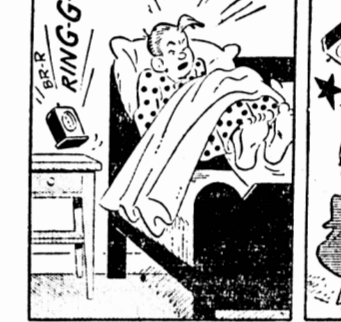

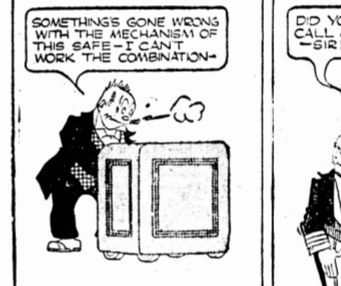
