LABOR DAY ATHLETIC MEET IS SUCCESSFUL

Large Attendance and Excellent Weather Favor Big Day At Charlottetown Driving Park.

Mellow September weather, crisp and bracing in the first hint of approaching autumn, attended the holding of the athletic meet at the Charlottetown Driving Park on Tuesday in observance of Labor Day.

Approximately two thousand five hundred people saw the long program through, and enjoyed every moment of it. It is regrettable that of this large crowd only about a thousand troubled to buy tickets, taking the less expensive way of going over the fence.

The most remarkable athletic performance of the afternoon was that of Hugh Campbell in the five mile run. Running easily and unopposed, because his competitors were far behind him, Campbell won in 27 min., 15 sec., fine time for the distance, but exceptionally good considering that he had the scantiest of training for the long hike.

George Ayers cleaned up the open events, making almost a clean sweep. He won the century, the quarter mile, the high and broad jumps, and was unplaced in but one event, the shot put.

The open bicycle events were captured by Ed. Hornby, whose superiority was convincing and unquestioned. Ed was far in the lead each race, and unchallenged by his nearest rival.

The going in the Union events was more sternly contested. Lem Rush was the biggest point winner taking premier place in the hundred and furlong dashes, and the shot put, and seconds and thirds in most of the other events.

A smart set of athletes from the Fire Department participated in the afternoon's program, and besides taking a hand in open competition, put on several numbers purely for themselves.

The hose coupling race was one of these features, and was won by Turner and Finlayson. The Duty Race was won by Fireman Ready.

Sixty-nine years ago Benito Juarez, President of Mexico, sat in the same chair and worked. The seat of the Mexican government was then the little frontier town of El Paso del Norte, Chih., now Juarez.

RELICS OF FORMER DAYS - A good deal of interest was shown by the citizens of Summerside on Friday in an old well, which was discovered by workmen, who were digging round a huge stump of a tree on the premises of Mr. Thane Campbell at the corner of Court and Summer Streets. The well is in a wonderful state of preservation. It was lined with small stone blocks and had evidently been well built. It was about twenty feet deep and two feet across. There was a slab of stone across the top of the well. Older citizens of Summerside who can remember when the town was supplied with water from public wells, before the days of the pump, said that this was one of many such wells that were to be found in certain parts of the town. One gentleman had a distinct recollection of it being in use at the time when the house, now occupied by Mr. Campbell, was built by Mr. T. P. Fanning. A wooden pump, made from a piece of timber about ten inches square, was the method used to draw the water from the well. The discovery of the well made a pleasant topic of conversation among the old folk, recalling days long forgotten when Summerside was known as Green's Shore. The well was probably built by Mr. Daniel Green, whose house was in the centre of what is now known as Court Street. He was a son of the original settlers of that name, who had several sons and divided his farm, which is now "Summerside" into strips of land and gave a portion to each son. Some of this property later passed into the hands of the Roman Catholic Church. Mr. Fanning bought the site that Mr. Campbell's house now stands on from Rev. Father Doyle, who was in charge of the parish at that time. Several citizens have made the suggestion that the well should be preserved - S.

Assistant Supervisor Visits P.E.I.

Mr. J. D. Belzile, Ottawa, Assistant to the Chief Supervisor of Illustration Stations who has been in the province for the past week inspecting the thirteen P. E. Island Illustration Stations, with the Provincial Supervisor, has returned to Ottawa.

Mr. Belzile was well pleased with the work at each station and stated that it was comparable to that carried on in any part of Canada. In comparison with the parts of Canada which he visited during the year, Mr. Belzile was impressed with the abundant growth of all crops. He states that our work with fertilizers, alfalfa, corn, etc., is good.

At present there are upwards of 211 stations situated in all parts of Canada. Just this spring a new district of supervision was established in Peace River, so that practical demonstrations might be given in that great new district. It is expected that the Chief Supervisor, Mr. John Moynan, will make a very short visit to Prince Edward Island later in the fall.
