Campaign Notes

(From The Examiner).

Almost every Prince Edward Island farmer raises pork and is interested in the pork market. Therefore it becomes of importance that our farmers should know and consider the following facts:

1. That during the year ending 31st March, 1921 Canada imported from the United States pork of the value of \$7,580,406.
2. That during the same period Canada exported to the United States pork of the value of only \$541,956.
3. Thus, notwithstanding the present moderate protection afforded by the Canadian tariff, WE PAID to the United States for pork during the year almost \$15 FOR EVERY DOLLAR THEY PAID TO US.
4. Every one of the eight candidates in this Province who is opposing the Melgion Government, Messrs. D. A. McKinnon, Sinclair, McLean, Hughes, Brown Jones, Malin and Wright, are committed to STRIKE OFF the present protective duty and ADMIT PORK to our markets FREE OF DUTY.
5. Four candidates, and four only stand for maintaining protective duties on our native pork. These four are Messrs. Donald McKinnon, John H. Myers, James McNeill and James McLean. THEY WOULD PROTECT OUR PORK PRODUCERS. The Liberal and Farmer candidates, name followers of King and Crerar, would STRIKE A DEADLY BLOW that threatens TO DESTROY the pork-raising industry in this Province.

As with pork so with eggs. Our farmers know very well the value of poultry and eggs in farm production. Last year Canadians paid \$26 for American eggs to every dollar that Americans paid for Canadian eggs. There is a small Canadian duty on imported eggs. Every Liberal and Farmer Candidate in this Province is committed to STRIKE OFF that duty and open our home market to a SLAUGHTER MARKET for American eggs. Donald McKinnon and John H. Myers stand to protect the Island henry against the prevailing political weasels who by stealth would destroy our poultry and egg trade.

As with pork and eggs, so with all food-stuffs. King and Crerar and their candidates' satellites would strike off all protective duties and admit all that our Yankee neighbors can produce free of duty. Our own farmers and fishermen, like all the farmers and fishermen throughout Canada produce food stuffs mainly. There is at present a moderate Canadian tariff to protect some, but not all, of these. The Melgion Government policy is to continue this protection to our farmers and fishermen. Is it needed? Is there danger of tens of millions of American food-stuffs being dumped into Canada, as is inevitable if all protective duties are swept away? IS THERE NOT DANGER that by such action OUR FARMERS AND FISHERMEN will be IMPOVERISHED or PUT OUT OF BUSINESS?

As to the vastness of the American surplus of foodstuffs now on hand we will quote from an authority that can hardly be discredited by the most ardent pro-American reciprocity men. We quote from Hon. Henry C. Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture at Washington, a member of President Harding's cabinet. Writing of The American Farmer and His Troubles, in "Current History" he says: "It is a terrible indictment to our modern civilization that THIS GREAT COUNTRY (the United States) should be in a state of what might almost be called ECONOMIC CHAOS BECAUSE OF OUR GREAT SURPLUS OF FOOD SUPPLY. That great surplus of food supply, big enough to cause chaos in the American market, stands ready to be DUMPED INTO CANADA if King and Crerar obtain the majority in our Parliament, which Heaven forbid!"

But this is not the only danger that threatens our farmers if the King and Crerar policies should prevail. Both of these false guides stand for free food stuffs, with other large additions to the free lists and also for "a general abolition of the tariff." In a word they would throw away scores of millions of customs revenues, and this at a time of Canada's financial peril from want of revenue to meet her great obligations and carry on her public services. How would King and Crerar and their followers make good the loss? They have not told us. They cannot tell. But the cold fact remains that nearly every new source of federal revenue has been exhausted or raised nearly to the limit. There remains the possibility of TAXING THE

AN OLD RESIDENT REVIEWS SITUATION

A Correspondent in his Seventy-Ninth Year Writes to Tell his Experiences and Recollections of Post Governments.

Sir,—I as an old timer would like to make a few statements in regard to the political question. I have in my mind all of the Dominion elections since Confederation, and I wondered if the younger men might not be interested enough to read some of the facts concerning the results of those elections since that time.

I was in Nova Scotia when the four provinces were united on July 1st, 1867. At that time the people were three parts against Confederation. The following September 1867 there was a General election, the conservatives won, although Sir Charles Tupper was the only conservative member from N. S. They promised the people to build the Intercolonial Railroad, which they did.

In 1872 there was another General election and the Conservatives were returned. In 1873 there was a charge brought against them, which was called the Pacific Scandal, and they resigned. There was another election, the Liberals won. The Pacific scandal was investigated, and it was discovered to be a complete fabrication. The Liberals held the Government from 73 to 78 during which time the country made no progress. Everything was at a stand still. There was no employment, no manufactures, crowds of men walking the streets idle, everything went fairly cheap, but there was no money to buy. While they were in power the question was brought up concerning a railroad from ocean to ocean. Their premier, Hon. Alexander McKenzie said "it couldn't be done it was impossible."

In 1878 before the election the Conservatives promised that if they were elected, they would put a duty on foreign goods, and allow raw material, which could not be produced in Canada to come in free. They also promised they would build a railroad from ocean to ocean. They were elected in 1878, and they fulfilled every promise. The Canadian Pacific Railroad was built. Cotton factories, sugar refineries, and other industries started up all over the country. There was employment for all, and everything was prosperous. What may I ask has the Liberal Government done for the development of Canada? True they built a railroad, parallel with the C. P. R. and which cost millions more than they estimated, and which put the country tremendously in debt, and of what use was it? At that time it was not needed, and neither was it a paying investment. Now how much would have been accomplished in settling the western provinces, were it not for the C. P. R. When the Liberals came in again in 1896, they promised to reduce the tariff. Did they do it? They took it off some things and put it on others, and the country was in no way improved during their term.

Now here in our own Province of P. E. I., the Conservatives had the Stanley built in 1887, and she did good service. The Liberals promised that if they were returned they would give better communication for this province. They had two steamers built, where are they? The good old Stanley is still here weathering the gale. The Liberals also spent thousands of dollars in having the Straits surveyed for a subway or tunnel. In 1911 when the conservatives came in they promised us a Car Ferry, you know the result. Could anything be better? We also know that were it not for the war and the heavy debts incurred by it, we should have had the whole of our Island Railway standardized.

What have the Liberals done for the development of Canada and the welfare of the people compared with what has been done by the Conservatives?

I am not prejudiced. I believe in supporting the party who has done the most and best work for Canada, and that party is surely the old conservative one. They are the progressives, and such being the case I vote progressive.

There is no other way out. The fact may be denied by reckless men on the eve of voting day, too late for a contradictory proof. Let our farmers remember the promises made by Liberal and opposition candidates on the eve of the last provincial election and how they were kept! Let them also remember that EVERY VOTE GIVEN ON 4th DECEMBER FOR LIBERAL or PROGRESSIVE CANDIDATES INVITES THE IMPOSITION OF LAND TAX, AN INCREASED INCOME TAX, or perhaps ANOTHER POLL TAX—UPON OUR FARMERS.

Arbuckle Makes Sweeping Denial Of All Charges

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 30.—His testimony a sweeping denial of all allegations presented by the state in its prosecution of the manslaughter charges against him. Roscoe C. Arbuckle spent the greater part of the day on the witness stand giving in detail, under direct and cross-examination, his story of the fatal party during which the state maintains Miss Virginia Rappe, motion picture actress, received injuries from which she later died.

Arbuckle's cross-examination was completed at 2.13 p. m. and he was excused from the stand.

Cavin McNab, chief counsel for the defense, said he would close the defense case with the reading of Chicago and New York depositions and with an offer to prove that George Glendon, hotel detective, obtained a statement tending to clear Arbuckle, from Miss Rappe. Glendon's testimony was ruled out last week.

Miss Louise Glann, motion picture actress, and six other well known in the Hollywood movie colony, for whom subpoenas were issued yesterday, had not been called to the stand late today.

Arbuckle's testimony.

Arbuckle testified that the party in his rooms was entirely impromptu, that only a few had been invited, but that the others had dropped in later and remained. He declared that he had an engagement to go out, and when he left the party and went into his bedroom it was for the purpose of changing his clothes, to keep this appointment.

"I locked my door," to keep the women and others out of the room. The bath room door struck against the prostitute form of Miss Rappe. That was the first time I knew she was in the room," Arbuckle said.

"Then what did you do?" Leo Friedman, assistant district attorney, conducting the cross-examination, asked.

"I picked her up and held her head."

"Did you say anything to her?" he was asked.

"Not a word," she was gasping and had a hard time getting her breath.

"Later," I asked her, "Is there anything I can do for you?" She said, "No, just leave me lie on the bed." Before this I had given her two glasses of water.

"How did she get from the bath room to the bed?"

"She walked; I helped her a little."

Later, Arbuckle returned to the bath room. When he returned, he testified, Miss Rappe was "thrashing about" on the floor. The witness said he picked her up and placed her on the bed.

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Hear Thornton-Davidson Case

MONTREAL, Nov. 30.—A claim for \$141,900.17 against Colonel Charles W. MacLean was pleaded before Mr. Justice MacLennan in the superior court today in the interests of Thornton, Davidson & Company, bankrupt stock brokers, who ask this amount as due on stock transactions occurring before the firm went into bankruptcy. In defense, Colonel MacLean said that if the stocks had also been appropriated, for the company, he declared, had never delivered them. Colin Cameron, former partner in the firm who faces a charge of misappropriating over \$100,000, which is alleged to have caused the subsequent failure of his company, was the principal witness in the latter's interest at today's hearing.

He testified that he and the colonel had agreed to purchase 200 shares of Canadian Foundries and Engineering stock amounting to \$123,245 without the knowledge of the other partners. He added that this did not appear to be an illegal transaction.
