DEATH PENALTY BEING DEBATED AT OTTAWA

Lively Discussion Takes Place on Second Reading of Bill.

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, April 11.—Speaking on the second reading to his bill for abolition of capital punishment in the House of Commons today, Rev. William Irvine, Labor, East Calgary declared the law of the tribes, "eye for an eye and tooth for tooth" give way for more humanitarian measures. He believed there were better ways of deterring crime. Capital punishment, he said, was degrading, demoralizing and an outrage to the finer sensibilities. It was a failure inasmuch as it did not act as a deterrent. Difficulty of securing convictions for murder when the penalty was death was advanced by Hance Logan, (Liberal, Cumberland) as an argument in favor of abolishing capital punishment. He continued that when the jury knew its decision would send a man to the gallows it

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE SUBMIT THEIR REPORT

Liabilities of the Province Increased During Year 1923 of Liberal Administration By \$2 20, 298.18.

Following is the report submitted by the Public Accounts Committee in the Legislature yesterday. To the Honourable, the Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly.

Your Committee on Public Accounts have had under consideration and review the reports of the Provincial Auditor, the report of the External Auditor and the accounts of the several departments of Government and submit the following brief summary of their enquiries.

The present Government assumed charge of the public affairs of the Province on September 6th, following the resignation of the late Government on the preceding day. At this date the total expenditure of the Province amounted to \$765, 921.88. On December 31st, after the payment of outstanding liabilities and current charges, the total debt amounted to \$1,013,745.17 showing the expenditure for less than four months to total the sum of \$247, 825.36. Of this sum \$128,973.56 was paid for education, \$51,156.35 for interest, \$20,361.72 for sinking fund

PROROGATION OF THE PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

Usual Ceremonial Display at Closing Yesterday Afternoon.—All Bills Assented To Except Church Union Bill.

The first session of the 40th General Assembly of Prince Edward Island was prorogued with the time honored ceremonial and military display as featured the opening on March 12th. A Guard of Honor accompanied by the Regimental Band was in attendance, a salute of 15 guns being fired from the Park Roadway as His Honor drove up to the House. The firing party consisted of a detachment from the 2nd Siege Battery under command of Major Hooper.

His Honor entered the House preceded by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod and after taking his seat assented to the bills passed during the session, with the exception of the Church Union Bill, from which His Honor withheld assent.

Earlier in the session His Honor assented to the Road Act and the Act amending the act Incorporating the Charlottetown Golf Club.

His Honor then delivered the following speech.

"Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly: In relieving you from your legislative duties I desire to convey to you my appreciation of the earnest and thorough manner with which all matters have been dealt with by you and for the several measures you have enacted. I thank you for the liberal provision which you have made for the maintenance of the public service and I assure you that the advice and aid I have expended with such prudence as is actually essential, consistent with efficiency in the several departments of the government, I sincerely trust that the blessing of Divine Providence may rest bounteously upon you in the discharge of your ordinary avocations as well as upon the people whom you represent."

The Clerk then said: "Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly: It is His Honor's will and pleasure that the Legislative Assembly be prorogued, and the Legislative Assembly is accordingly prorogued."

The Guard of Honor was made up of 100 men of all ranks drawn from the 1st Battalion (105th Battalion, C. E. F.) under command of Captain W. J. Macdonald, with Lieutenants Howard and DesRoches.

His Honor was accompanied to the House by his Altesse de Camp Colonels Peake and Jenkins and Private Secretary, Captain Palmer.

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WIRE BRIEFS

Last Minute News Flashed in Over the Wires

(Canadian Press.) PARIS, April 11.—Premier Poincaré has virtually decided to dissolve parliament tomorrow. Official notice of dissolution will probably be promulgated tomorrow evening.

(Canadian Press.) SOUTHAMPTON, April 11.—The Cunarder Mauretania which left Southampton in tow this morning for Cherbourg for repairs is reported to have touched ground when turning Calshot Point near the Isle of Wight. She was not damaged and proceeded almost immediately but the report when first received caused wild excitement until the truth was known.

(Canadian Press.) WILMINGTON, N. C. April 11.—A wrecked vessel with bodies floating about is reported off shore by wireless from an unnamed steamer.

It is believed to be the Halifax owned tern schooner Maid of France commanded by Captain C. A. Haugen of La Have and manned by a Nova Scotia crew. The vessel sailed from the Barbadoes with molasses thirty days ago for here and is overdue. F. K. Warren and Company of Halifax are managing owners.

(Canadian Press.) HALIFAX, April 11.—Premier Armstrong outlined in the Provincial Legislature this afternoon plans that were being made for the entertainment of a party of twenty-five members of the House of Commons from the west who with their families plan to visit Nova Scotia from Thursday to Sunday of next week. The program includes a luncheon on the trans-Atlantic liner Regina and a harbor excursion.

(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, April 11.—Weather permitting, the first Great Lakes steamer for this season will leave Port McNicoll for Fort William, Friday, April 25, followed by at least five sailings each week thereafter, according to an announcement made at Canadian Pacific headquarters today.

(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, April 11.—After scrutiny of the new budget A. H. Brittain, of the Maritime Fish Corporation, said: "There is no reduction in canned fish while other canned goods, including fruit, have reductions from 6 to 2 1/2%. This is vital to large packers in British Columbia and even more vital to the small individual packer on the Canadian Atlantic coast. Personally I think this is merely an oversight and will be adjusted as soon as the Minister of Finance has his attention drawn to it."

(Canadian Press.) WASHINGTON, April 11.—Air pilots of the Honduras revolutionary forces have begun bombing raids on Tegucigalpa, the capital, and have killed a number of women and children. Four bombs were dropped near the grounds where members of the landing force from the United States cruiser Milwaukee were exercising but dispatches to the Navy Department today from Rear Admiral Dayton made no mention of any casualties among United States naval forces.

(Canadian Press.) NEW ORLEANS, April 11.—Mexican rebels have disabled the gunboat Bravo at Tampico, and the pride of the Obregon navy may be out of commission several months, according to a rebel official report brought here today for transmission to revolutionary headquarters.

(Canadian Press.) KAPUSKASING, Ont., April 11.—The remaining part of the old town site of Kapuskasing commonly called Stewartville, was totally destroyed by fire this morning at an estimated loss of \$200,000, partly covered by insurance. The fire is thought to be a deliberate case of arson.

Reparations Report Is Officially Approved

(Canadian Press.) PARIS, April 11.—The Reparations Commission today officially approved of the report submitted to it by the Experts Committee Wednesday on the German reparations question. The recommendation of the commission is that the report be approved conditionally upon the acceptance of it by Germany. The commission was unanimous in registering its approval.

German representatives will hear the Expert Committee representatives Thursday April 17.

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MAY SERVE TO STRENGTHEN RELATIONS

Visit of Rumanian Royalty to Paris Regarded with Interest.

(Canadian Press.) PARIS, April 11.—There is an inclination in diplomatic circles to interpret the toast by President Millerand at the dinner given King Ferdinand and Queen Marie of Rumania at a last evening as indicating that there is an important political phase to the visit of the Rumanian sovereigns.

The President said he was expressing the desires of his country "in expressing the wish that the relations so ancient and so close that unite them be more and more strengthened."

Diplomatic quarters will be surprised if an accord of some kind fails to materialize from the present visit of the Rumanian King and his Foreign Office.

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
