—DAIRY MEETING.—A meeting of the patrons of the Diamond Dairy and Mt. Carmel Dairy Co. was held at Abram's Village on Tuesday afternoon, 7th inst. Though the attendance was not very large the meeting was an unqualified success. The president, Mr. Stanislaus Gallant, in opening the meeting, said that the patrons were there assembled for a good purpose, namely to discuss matters relative to the welfare of the Dairy industry, an industry which for a number of years had been very remunerative to its patrons, and now under war conditions had taken a leading place in the farm. The chief question for discussion was whether milk should be paid by test as in the practice with most of other cheese factories. Both sides of the question were thoroughly sifted, the chief contention of the pros being that such a method would tend to induce farmers to improve the grade of their cows, also that it was only the fair and equitable way of payment and it would also be a preventive to anyone (should there be) who would be inclined to water the milk. Those against argued that though the method would be put into practice it could not be done satisfactorily at the cheese factory where there is so much to take up the attention of cheese-makers. "If some year, probably a summer, should be paid in excess of what a patron should get, or should be wanting to some other patron, after all had their turn at such luck. A motion was taken on the question, namely, that milk should be paid by the hundredweight. Mr. Harry Darby was the mover and Mr. Joseph S. Cormier seconded the motion, which was passed unanimously. Mr. Cyrus Gallant recorded the proceedings of the meeting. M

WONDERFUL RED CROSS DIAMOND.

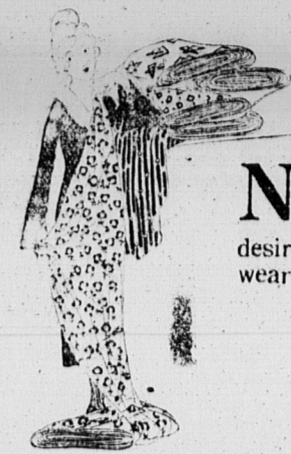
On first thought it seems inappropriate to talk about a wonderful new diamond in war times. But the fact that this diamond has been donated to the British Red Cross makes it not only proper but necessary to speak of it at some length. For four years there has been a Red Cross sale at Christy's in London and each year some entirely unexpected treasure has formed the centre of interest. Until recently no attraction was presented for this year. But quite unexpectedly appeared this wonderful diamond, of the palest exquisite primrose yellow and of enormous weight for a diamond—surpassing all the famous diamonds known, except the "Stars of South Africa" (in the Imperial crown and the drop of the Royal Sceptre) and the Marat diamond belonging to the Rajah of Dohome. The famous Koh-i-noor in Queen Mary's crown weighs not quite 108 carats; the Regent or Pitt diamond, famous up to this time as being the only diamond showing a Maltese cross in the top facet, weighs 136 1/2 carats. The new diamond which weighs 205 carats is in the shape of a perfect Maltese cross in its top facet. It has the power of absorbing the rays of any brilliant illumination to which it is exposed and afterwards emitting them in phosphorescent light in the dark. The diamond was found in the De Beers Mines in Grintalund West in 1901. So far it has no name named but will probably be known as the Red Cross Diamond.

BE READY TO FIGHT SAYS AUSTRIA LABOR MANIFESTO

BERNE, SWITZERLAND, May 9.—Labor and Socialist organizations in Austria threaten revolt against the government action in suspending parliament. Swiss newspapers print a telegram from Vienna quoting the "Social Demokratich correspondenz" to the effect that a committee of the socialist party and a committee of the German socialist deputies club have decided to issue manifesto to the government's action on which the following declaration will be made: "If absolutism is re-established out of regard for pan-Germanism which is prolonging the war, the working class will be forced to fight for their right." The manifesto concludes by exhorting the workers to hold themselves ready to fight if necessary.

GERMAN MONEY BEHIND ENEMY PROPAGANDA IN PARIS

PARIS, May 4.—At the resumption today of the trial of persons involved in the affair of the Bonnet Rouge, a newspaper said to have German financial backing and to have been engaged in propaganda for the enemy, Jean Laymarie, former director of the Ministry of the Interior under the Malvy administration of that office and later head of the secret service, took the witness stand today. M. Leymarie testified that M. Malvy

in October, 1916 told him to order the Prefecture of Police not to deliver further passports to M. Duval, Director of the Bonnet Rouge, or to M. Marion, assistant manager of the newspaper. Later after two of the defendants in the present case, Landua and Galdsky, had pleaded with him in Duval's behalf, he allowed the latter to obtain the passport because Duval declared it was necessary for him to travel to Switzerland on account of French interests in the liquidation of the San Stefano Casino Company. The witness explained the restitution of a check of 155,000 francs of M. Duval, after the check had been taken from him at the Swiss frontier. He said he had understood the Ministry of War itself had decided to return the check itself, interposing no objection because it believed the sum represented the liquidation from the Casino Company. M. Duval assured me that German interests had been excluded from the San Stefano Company," added M. Leymarie. "I recognize that I showed too great confidence and that I erred. I paid for my fault by my resignation."

M. Vercaesson, one of the accused, admitted having brought back from Switzerland for M. Duval nearly half a million francs, Duval assuring him the money was from French sources. M. Duval at this point confessed that he had deceived Vercaesson and asked his pardon, declaring that this was the only time he had practiced deceit.



A SAD CONFESSION

Germany Miscalculated the Unity of the British Empire. The German newspaper, Der Tag, some time after the great war had gotten under way, was forced to a sad confession: "So many of our calculations have deceived us. We expected that British India would rise when the first shot was fired in Europe, but in reality thousands of Indians came to fight with the British against us. We anticipated that the whole British Empire would be torn to pieces, but the colonies appear to be closer united than ever with the Mother Country. We expected a triumphant rebellion in South Africa, yet it turned out nothing but a failure. We expected trouble in Ireland, but, instead, she sent her best soldiers against us. We anticipated that the party of peace at any price would be dominant in England, but it melted away in the ardor to fight against Germany. We reckoned that England was degenerate and incapable of placing any weight in the scale, but she seems to be our principal enemy. "The same has been the case with France and Russia. We thought that France was depressed and divided, and we found that she is a formidable opponent. We believed that the Russian people were far too discontented to fight for their government, and we made our plans on the supposition of a rapid collapse of Russia; but, instead, she mobilized her millions quickly and well, and her people are full of enthusiasm and their power is crushing. Those who led us into all these mistakes and miscalculations have laid upon themselves a heavy responsibility."—New York Tribune.
