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SALONIKI, October 15.—(Delayed)—The Serbians are holding the Austro-Germans and Bulgarians in check. A deadly struggle is going on between the Germans and Serbians in Prachova and the result is still indeterminate. The Serbians are retreating at Belgrade. The latter retreating after the methods first applied at Louvain, killing indiscriminately the population of children and women. Some terrible reports concerning massacres are coming.

Bulgarian regular troops are concentrating at Strumitza, aiming at cutting the railway, numerous bands of Comitatdjis appeared in the vicinity of Doiran. The inhabitants seeking refuge in adjoining Greek territory.

Saloniki Bay is dotted with transports with British, French, and Greek army in concentrating. This is also their landing port. The town is full of Serbian families seeking refuge from the scourge visiting their sorely tried country.

Their eyes are anxiously turned upon the bay which they watch for more ships bringing help. Will they be in time? Is the anxious question asked. "How long can you last?" I asked a Serb.

"The Colonel cannot say," he replied, "but we shall fight to the last disputing every inch of our territory, give us a little help in time and the Germans will find to their cost that they do not pass through Serbia."

"The eyes of Serbia are anxiously and impatiently fixed upon Saloniki," says a despatch. "The urgent need of allied troops at Kumanovo and Vranovo grows hourly."

"The Bulgarians are attacking in great force all along the line between Zaitchar in the Tomok river region on the north, to Kotchana, in the Bregalnitsa river on the south."

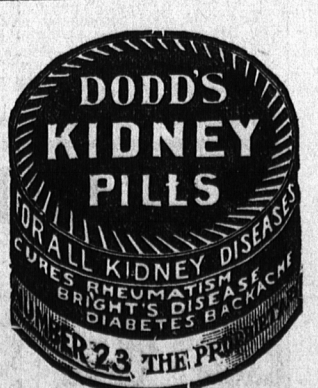
"Near Fyri Palanka, on the Kostendji-Kumanovo road they have attacked with several regiments and have reached Tchovpine Brod, whence

they can threaten the lines of Kumanovo and Vranje, as well as the Nish-Saloniki railway.

"Near Kotchana the Serbians are successfully holding up the attack of two Bulgarian divisions. The situation is especially grave near Kumanovo. The Serbians have been thrown back near Kniashevatz."
