Must Cancel Allied Debts

PARIS, Feb. 7.—All debts among the allied associated powers must be cancelled, and Germany's to the allied reduced in proportion. In addition, Great Britain must abandon entirely her reparations claims against Germany. The idea is that France, for example, could pay her debts to the United States and Great Britain by means of a third series of bonds, the so-called C bonds, to be issued by Germany to the Reparations Commission in accordance with the reparations system established last May, and that the United States and Great Britain would forthwith throw these obligations into the fire, thereby relieving Germany to that extent.

"Only this, in my opinion can economic salvation of the world be assured." In this blunt fashion, Luchins, Minister of the Liberated regions under both Clemenceau and Briand, and foremost figure in French industry and finance, formulated today his conception of the requirements for European reconstruction. The international proposals at the beginning of this despatch, however, stand on as his sensational utterance. What he suggests in effect is to set down Germany's obligations to more than half on the condition that Great Britain and the United States cancel debts owed them by France and other nations.

Effect on France.

While he did not say so, it is probable that under such an arrangement France's reparational revenue out of Germany would be insufficient to pay her position, if indeed it provided more than the sums required for the restoration of her devastated regions. If the C bonds, which represent eighty billions of the one hundred and thirty-two billion gold marks that is Germany's total indebtedness, were thrown into the fire, as Luchins proposes, Germany's many would owe only six-twentieths billion, of which over two billion has been paid.

This remaining sixty billion, however, would be diminished still further by Great Britain's abandonment of her share, which is twenty-two per cent. France, apparently, would get only something over thirty billion gold marks.
