DOMINION DAY.

Tomorrow Canada will pass another milestone in its march of progress and celebrate one more anniversary of its birth as a Dominion. The natal day comes auspiciously in the midsummer, when field and forest are at their best, when sky and sea, lake and river beam their brightest in the glory of the summer sun. A spacious and a fertile land is ours, did we but realize it as we should. And at this season of the year it ought to be easy to believe that truly our lines have been cast in pleasant places and we have a goodly heritage. Canada is rich in the treasures of soil and sea, forest and mine, the last but half explored as yet. Richer still in her lineage, the great traditions of her race stock, the fulness of her ordered liberties, and the already great achievements of her people.

The great English-speaking Republic beside us is eighty years older than we as a nation, but the Canada of today is fairly comparable in population, area, wealth, manufactures, and resources with the United States when it was forty years old. In the volume of our trade, in railways, canals, telegraphs and the later modern improvements, which had then but begun, we are far ahead of what the United States was in 1820. We may therefore with fair reason forecast our future progress in some such ratio as that already achieved by the people beside us and look forward to the time when the Canadian family shall number fifty—perhaps a hundred millions of people. For the tide of immigration is now setting full and free towards our shores, and the westward flow of population, which began thousands of years ago, has now reached its ultimate bounds and is ponding up in the last west of the North American continent. Something we might complain of an equal development between our east and west, something of federal ne-

glect of the eastern section to which pertains the open winter ports, so much of the shipping, the fisheries the Atlantic outlook and the mineral wealth of Canada. But these are foreign to the spirit of the day and we will not obtrude them here. The East of Canada will yet assert itself. The Dominion is growing to greatness and the day is not one for repining. Rather is it a time for hope, for high aspiration, for unshaken trust in a great future under the smile of Heaven for the firm faith of each man Canadian in Canada, the faith of each Province in its sister Province. It is a time for remembrance, too, of the great army of honest toilers who made Canada what it is, a time to reverence and emulate their steady independence and their homely virtues, that we and those who follow us shall keep unattained the priceless legacy they have left us.

It is a time to set high our national ideals, and to realize that our strength and greatness subsist not in our abundant square miles or rich mineral resources, our expanding commerce or accumulated wealth. The victories of Greece let in upon her the luxuries of the East and covered her glory with a night of ages. 'Tis fares the land where wealth accumulates and men decay. We must learn what are the elements that make for true greatness and grandeur in a state. We must learn to shun as we would a pestilence, the too prevalent commercialism, the tendency to greed and graft, the lust for spoil, the venal vote, which are mingling within the social and political fabric today and which, if left unchecked may prove our ruin. True manhood and womanhood, the homely virtues of truth, honesty and honest toil, self-reverence, self-knowledge and self control in high and low, the love of public right and public order, let these virtues, still abiding in our land, be prized and cultivated and Canada will be and remain both truly strong and great.

There was both instruction and inspiration in the addresses of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor at the school closing yesterday, in which he referred to the claims of the Battlefields Fund and the historic significance of the Quebec celebration. We trust that it may bear fruit.

Parliament will hereafter sit on Saturdays till the close of the session. This affords an indication that prorogation is drawing near. The session has already covered seven months, and is the longest, with a single exception in Canadian history. In 1903 the session lasted from March 12 to October 24, a period of seven months and twelve days. The present session began on November 28th, 1907.

Dr. Daniel, M. P. informs the St. John Telegraph that there is, in his opinion some prospect of another session of Parliament being held before a dissolution. This is possible, as dating from the return of the writs on December 15, 1904 the full five years term will not expire till December, 1909. But Sir Wilfrid will want to avoid the trap into which Sir Charles Tupper fell in 1896 by being caught with the time limit before the work of the session was completed. Yet Parliament might meet in January next, hold a session of eight months, and still get through in September, 1909.

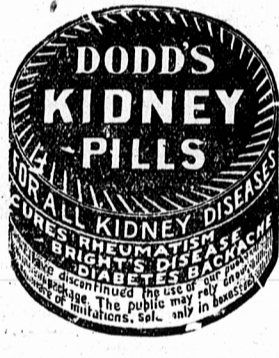
