DECREASE OF EXPORTS IN DAIRY INDUSTRY

Canada's Butter And Cream Trade Decreases, But Cheese Sales Greater For Year

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—A considerable decrease in the export of cream, whose exclusive destination is the United States, is indicated in the monthly report for September issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. A total of 245,974 gallons was exported to the United States last month valued at \$507,186, compared with 329,767 gallons valued at \$668,730 in August and 342,406 gallons, valued at \$620,670 in September last year.

Sea Fish Catch Shows Decrease

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 23.—Canada's catch of sea fish in the nine month period of January 1 to September 30, 1929, was worth nearly \$2,000,000 more to the fishermen in landed value than the catches in the corresponding period of 1928, notwithstanding that the total landings were smaller.

PASSED AWAY

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 23.—Dr. Theresa Bannan, of the Syracuse, N. Y., city health board, died last night at the Victoria Hospital, where she was taken on Monday from the steamer Nerissa. Dr. Bannan, who was taking the round trip from New York to Newfoundland for her health, became suddenly ill with internal trouble before the ship reached Halifax on the return trip. She was made as comfortable as possible on board and was rushed to the hospital, when the steamer docked, where several physicians attended her. She never fully recovered consciousness. Relatives are expected to arrive in Halifax tonight.

BACK FROM DAIRYMEN'S CONVENTION

Mr. J. A. Dewar, New Perth, Reports Very Successful Meetings of National Dairy Council At Toronto, And Gives Impress- ions of Trip.

Mr. J. A. Dewar, New Perth, returned Tuesday evening from attending the annual convention of the National Dairy Council which met in the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, on Oct. 18 and 19. Mr. Dewar reports that the convention was considered the best ever held, there being delegates present from all the Provinces of Canada consisting of one half producers and one half manufacturers.

ROUTINE

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—Some routine matters were disposed of and one or two important questions were discussed at the regular meeting of Cabinet today. Premier Mackenzie King was not able to be present and no official announcements were made at the end of the council.

Lowering Of U. S. Fish Duties Is Company's Plan

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—The Atlantic Coast Fisheries, a corporation with Canadian connections, wants the duties on fish lowered. F. W. Bryce, president of the corporation told the Senate lobby committee today. He said five or six of the company's 15 trawlers operated in Canadian waters but about 80 per cent of the catch was landed at Groton, Mass.

Unsatisfactory State Of Canada's Steel Industry

MONTREAL, Oct. 23.—The "unsatisfactory condition" of Canada's steel industry is attributed by H. M. Jacquays, vice president of the Steel Company of Canada to the heavy importation of finished and semi-finished steel products.

Liquor Exports Still Troubling Federal Cabinet

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—Behind the scenes here, considerable discussion is going on with regard to the United States and it is being rather intensified by the figure the liquor question is cutting in the Ontario elections. There is little doubt that a majority of the cabinet now favor an act at the next session prohibiting the export of liquor to the United States.

WELCOME RAIN

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Ont., Oct. 23.—A warm rain falling over western Ontario yesterday, arrived in time to save the fall wheat crop and brought relief to hundreds of farmers. Plowing will be aided in many districts, although more rain is needed to make this task easy.

SUIT DISMISSED

PICOTU, N. S., Oct. 23.—The suit of Robert Campbell against the town of Stellarton for damages in connection with the death of his wife of typhoid fever two years ago was dismissed in Supreme Court today. Campbell sought damages on the ground that his wife contracted the disease from infected water supplied by the town.

STEAMERS AGROUND AND MISSING WITH LARGE LOSS OF LIFE FEARED—ACTS OF HEROISM, THE TRUE STORY OF WHICH MAY NEVER BE HEARD, MEN- TIONED IN DESPATCHES.

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Oct. 23.—Four steamers aground, one tug missing, a carry fifteen minutes overdue and the six man crew of a barge rescued, after being adrift for nearly 24 hours. That is the toll of the storm king, who during the past forty-eight hours has wrecked his will on land and water. What the sum total of the damage caused by the boisterous monarch will be, cannot be estimated. It will be in the millions of dollars, without doubt.

AVIATORS ARE STILL MISSING

Search Flyers Two Weeks Gone Have Not Been Heard From— One Other Plane Resorted Safe.

SANITARIUM

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Oct. 23.—A \$1,600,000 anti-tuberculosis sanitarium will be built in the vicinity of Montreal in the near future. The cost will be borne by the Quebec Government, which will contribute 60 per cent of the costs, and the city of Montreal will subscribe 40 per cent. The necessary appropriations have already been approved.
