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Showdown In U.S. Department Of Agriculture

(Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Henry Wallace, Secretary of the United States Department of Agriculture, tonight offered a new post to George N. Peek, the farm administrator, in a shakeup of the department aimed at ending disputes among his aides. Just what proposition was put up to Peek was not disclosed pending a decision by the latter.

It was believed that it was a "take it or leave it" proposition and friends of Peek were divided on whether he would take it or resign.

The showdown came after conferences at the White House and Agriculture Department. Wallace went to the White House with Rexford Tugwell, assistant secretary, who has been at odds with Peek. Peek later had a conference with the President.

Should Peek resign Chester C. Davis, director of the production section of the Farm Administration, was mentioned in official circles as a likely successor.

No Comment On Free State

DUBLIN, Dec. 5.—(A.P.)—Neither proclamation of an Irish Republic nor a general election to decide the issue will be the answer to the London Government's refusal to consider secession of the Free State from the Empire, it was learned tonight on highest authority.

The answer of J.H. Thomas, Secretary of State for the Dominions, that the United Kingdom would not consider the "hypothetical" question of secession was received in Dublin with a shrug of the shoulders.

A former minister of the O'Connell Regime said "De Valera wants to come to declare a republic, and Thomas prefers to let De Valera take the initiative."

Loyal War Comrade

PLEA TO SAVE MAN FROM PAUPER'S GRAVE

A man's loyalty to his war comrade, and an appeal that the latter should be saved from a pauper's grave, were features of an inquest at Stepney.

The coroner, Dr. Guthrie, inquired in the death of Thomas Morgan, 43, a street singer, who died after having his leg broken.

Mr. Robert Mason, of Perth-street, Dalston, gave evidence that he and Morgan served in France together in the Flying Corps, and parted company in 1917. About six years ago they met at Stepney.

In October he was told that Morgan was in hospital, and since then he saw him every day. They observed Armistice Day together, and he remained with Morgan until he died later that day.

After being complimented by the coroner on the way he had behaved, Mr. Mason remarked: "It is only that a comrade would have done for any other old comrade. This man had no friends or relatives in the world."

When the coroner recorded a verdict of "accidental death" Mr. Mason appealed for permission to apply to the British Legion so that his old comrade would not have to be buried in a pauper's grave.

The coroner granted this permission, and added that he would do everything in his power to assist.

Nova Scotia Fruit Growers Wind-up Convention

KENTVILLE, N. S., Dec. 7.—Wending his way through a mass of resolutions submitted in the hope of strengthening the industry, 70th annual convention of the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers' Association came to a close here today with the election of Arthur Keasal of Annapolis Royal as President. C. Perry Poole, of Lakeville was chosen Vice-President.

Delegates gave long consideration to the numerous motions and finally decided by voicing vigorous protest against legislation advocated by the Ship-by-Rail Association which would increase cost of motor truck transportation to an unreasonable degree.

They recommended appointment of an overseas representative of the apple industry, the Provincial Department of Agriculture to purchase surplus apples for the purpose of self-supporting. Criticism of methods of handling apple shipments in the port of Halifax was offered in a recommendation for amendment to the Fruit Act to provide a penalty for rough and careless handling of shipments in transit. Consideration also was given to technicalities of marketing and grading, and directors were authorized to institute a special study of the possibility of obtaining some form of "wind" insurance.

Will Celebrate Cartier's Discovery

MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—(C. P.)—Problem of fittingly celebrating the fourth centenary of the discovery of Canada by Jacques Cartier will be placed before the forthcoming conference of Provincial Premiers.

Premier R. B. Bennett today told a delegation of representatives from Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Three Rives a Montreal and Toronto. The delegation met the Premier here following the Premier's attendance at the funeral of Sir Arthur Currie.

The delegation was headed by Senator C. P. Beaubien and included: Premier L. A. Taschereau; Hon. W. H. Price, Attorney General of Ontario; Hon. T. S. Kennedy, Ontario Minister of Agriculture; Col. Wilfrid Bovey, Director of Extramural Relations at McGill University and representing Prince Edward Island and Hon. Fernand Elmiert, Mayor of Montreal.

If the celebration was to be undertaken it must be done fittingly. Premier Beaubien told the delegation. The matter might involve large expenditures and he thought it wise to place the matter before the forthcoming inter-provincial conference. This course would afford both means of sounding out the provinces on their reaction and of preparing public opinion for the event.

Senator Beaubien said that while the landing of Jacques Cartier on the Gaspé Coast 400 years ago was primarily of interest to the Maritime Provinces, Quebec and Ontario the Western Provinces would be made to sense their background of history through celebration of the event. It would draw the provinces together, he said.

Grain Elevators In Argentina

The construction of grain elevators has been a live issue in Argentina for many years, writes the Canadian Trade Commissioner, and investigations both official and unofficial have been undertaken in certain foreign countries, including Canada and the United States, but up to the present little headway has been made.

Insufficiency of capital has no doubt been the principal cause of lack of elevators, and organized labour is hostile. The method of storage of grain pending shipment is in bags. These may be piled in the open and covered with tarpaulins, or placed in sheds. In this way storage is cheap. Consequently in order to be successful, the operating of elevators will depend on the cost to the farmers for storing and handling. Speaking generally, the farmer produces his grain and sells it to the local storekeeper who has been financing him. The storekeeper in turn sells to the grain trade, which classifies and mixes before exporting, and when necessary, dries and cleans. A bill passed last session of Congress in September, authorizing the construction of a general system of country and terminal elevators as a public service, is a step forward and now awaits promulgation.

Youth Wounded Refuses To Talk

NEW ROCHESTER, N. S., Dec. 8.—(C.P.)—Wounded in the side from a rifle bullet, Murray Keddy, 19, was enroute to hospital in Halifax, refusing to tell police where the bullet came from.

The youth was in the neighborhood woods with two gangs of men gathering wood for barrel hoops. Companions said, and was shot as he stood up after having a smoke.

It was intimated Royal Canadian Mounted Police officers would question the boy on his arrival in Halifax where it was expected the slug would be extracted.

BEEF CATTLE

The progressive steps in growing a beef steer are first to develop by continuous growth a large frame well covered with muscle and never entirely devoid of fat; then to deposit on this body of frame and muscle the fat necessary to give the animal the desired finish. To have the first step requires a ration rich in bone and muscle building feeds according to local conditions; to accomplish the second step a somewhat similar ration is needed at first, but gradually changed to one containing a larger proportion of fat producing carbonaceous foods, such as corn, barley and peas.

Increases should be gradual. The condition of the steers should be watched and the grain feed fitted to the rate of progress, so as to keep the steers gaining steadily to have them fit to sell by the date at which it is planned to market them. The results of years of practical experience of the raising and feeding of steers in all parts of Canada are to be found in publications issued from Ottawa by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, and, in view of Canada's great increase in cattle exports to the British market, this accumulated knowledge, which can be obtained for the asking, should be in the possession of every breeder and feeder of beef cattle.
