Little Hope For Olympic Captain

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Feb. 2. (A.P.)—Hospital authorities last night announced that Albert Brehme, 27 year old brakeman on the German Olympic four-man bobsled that crashed through a curve on the run today, was in a dangerous condition with a fractured skull, broken right wrist, severely injured spine and lacerations of the face.

Captain Fritz Grau, pilot of the crew, was "seriously" hurt, hospital authorities said. The 37 year old Berlin manufacturer suffered

fractures of the right shoulder and hip, concussion of the brain and lacerations.

Two team mates were less seriously injured and were said to be in no danger. Hellmuth Hoppmann, a manufacturer in Braunschweig, suffered severe leg lacerations, possible internal injuries and lacerations.

Rudolf Krotki, masseur for the team and a substitute today, strained his back.

The accident was the second to the German bobsledders and left only Hans Killian to pilot the last of the sleds that were considered a real threat in the winter Olympics starting Thursday. Captain Werner Zahn broke his left arm and Dr. Melhorn fractured a hand when the first German bobs crashed Sunday.

The smash-up today most spectacular and serious in the two year history of the slide, occurred at Shady Corner, a verticle ice turn 28 feet high. Grau apparently lost control going into the curve at a speed estimated at 70 miles an hour. He crashed through the top and was flung with his mates 150 feet into a deep ravine on the side of Mount Hoenberg.

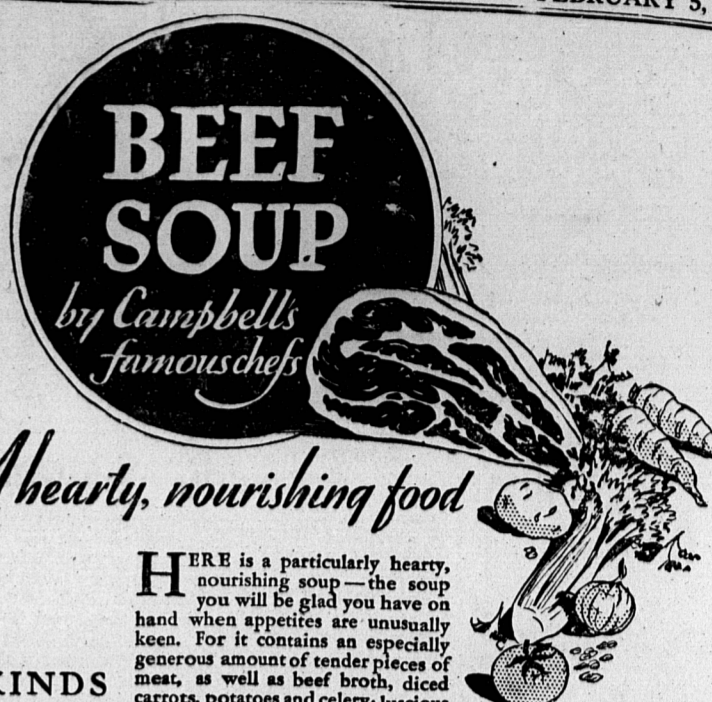
Halifax Board Of Health Is Defied

Canadian Press)—Unabashed by threats that their condemned house would be torn down over their heads if they did not decamp by the end of January, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Squires were still snug in their quarters at 989 Barrington Street today.

Visited by health board officials, they offered a compromise from their ultimatum delivered early in January, when they defied the health board and the movers of the building to move them; they promised to vacate the premises as soon as they could find new quarters, and the health board gave them an additional ten days to get out.

The Squires case was a problem at the January meeting of the health board. The secretary reported that the couple had refused to budge, and further words with them would be futile. For some time the place had been condemned as unfit for habitation.
