Plans Completed For Meeting Of Mar. Trade Bd.

Completion of plans for next week's annual meeting here of the Maritime Board of Trade was announced at a council meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade held yesterday afternoon. President J. J. Morris presided.

Resolutions, three in number, were drafted for presentation at the Maritime meeting. These dealt respectively with the need of increased accommodation for automobiles on the Borden-Tormentine ferry, improved port facilities for Charlottetown, and improved rail transportation between Charlottetown and the mainland, including continuance the year around of the Pullman car and double train services.

The matter of steamship service between Montreal and this Province was discussed, and a resolution passed asking the Canadian Steamship Lines to establish a freight and passenger service between the ports of Charlottetown and Summerside, and Montreal and such other ports as the company may see fit.

Mr. N. Rattenbury, chairman of the industrial committee, submitted correspondence from Mr. Guy G. Porter, Perth, N. B., relative to Mr. Porter speaking here on the manufacture of alcohol from Island products for industrial fuel. It was suggested that Mr. Rattenbury try to arrange to have Mr. Porter speak at the quarterly meeting of the Board on October 14.

Mr. R. E. Mutch referred to the need of re-establishing steamship service between Charlottetown and Boston, for which tenders had been called, but with regard to which no word had been received.

Chairman A. Belcher of the entertainment committee announced that all arrangements had been completed for the Maritime Board meeting, which opens Sept. 23 at the Canadian National Hotel. Among the speakers will be Hon. C. A. Dunning, Dominion Finance Minister, and Hon. R. C. Matthews, president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

President Morris was appointed the voting delegate for the Charlottetown Board at the Maritime convention.

WILL PUSH FOR CONCLUSION OF RATES INQUIRY

"The situation so far as the City Council is concerned remains unchanged," stated Mr. Russel Chandler, chairman of the Light Committee, interviewed on the question of the sale of New England Gas and Electric Association security holdings in the Maritime Electric Company.

"We intend to push for the conclusion of investigations into the rates which the company is charging, and we are still giving the same consideration to purchase, either by negotiation or by statute of the Legislature, Mr. Chandler explained. "The situation has not changed in the slightest degree. We are still dealing with the Maritime Electric Company, regardless of who owns the stock."

OVER \$2,000,000
At Halifax, Mr. J. C. McKeen, vice-president of the Royal Securities, confirmed the securities purchase recorded yesterday.

More than \$2,000,000 are involved in the transaction, the second largest power deal in the Maritimes in less than a year, the other properties of the Cambridge company having been purchased by the Nova Scotia Light and Power Company last December. These latter were located in western Nova Scotia.

The Maritime Electric properties serve approximately 8,000 customers and the suburban territory is quite extensive. No immediate change in the operating organization is planned, it was stated.

Freetown purchases its power from the New Brunswick Power Commission and has a steam stand-by; St. Stephen and St. Andrew's buy from the International Power Corporation and Canada Cottons; Charlottetown has its own generating system and is linked with Montague which has a hydro plant.

Shoppers in queues before food shops have recently got out of hand and quarrelled with the militiamen detailed to maintain order.

DEPENDS ON BLOCKADES
SAINT JEAN DE LUZ, France, Sept. 16—(A.P.)—General Emilio Mola, Fascist conqueror of Irun and San Sebastian, tonight moved his regular troops to the Zaragosa and Madrid fronts, depending on land and sea blockades to starve out the remaining government resistance in the northern sector.
Carlisle (Monarchist) and Fascist militiamen patrolled the streets of San Sebastian while in the Harbor of Bilbao swift Fascist speedboats effectively cut off all communications between Government-held territory and France, except by warship.
