SOLDIERS WELCOMED—On Friday, September 12, a delightful party was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John P. Griffin for their two soldier sons Bennet and John S., also for Charles Cullicu, Frank Lidstone and Wesley Strang. About eighty guests were present. Dining was the chief feature of the evening, the music being furnished by well known musicians, namely Messrs Arthur and P. Dalton, violinists and Misses Belle Howard, M. Bulger and M. Dalton, accompanists. Lunch was served by Mrs. Griffin with the assistance of Mrs. Orville Dalton, Misses Belle Howard and Ethel MacGregor. All enjoyed themselves immensely.

FORWARD MOVEMENT—Rev. Dr. E. E. Braithwaite, National Organizer of the Inter-Church Forward Movement and Rev. R. W. Ross of Halifax, Presbyterian Organizer for the Maritime Provinces will be in Summerside and Charlottetown and other points during the coming week. They will arrive in Prince Edward Island on Monday evening going first to Summerside. On Tuesday evening a mass meeting of all denominations will be held in Zion Church, Charlottetown at 8 o'clock. It is hoped that all who possibly can will hear these talented speakers on this vital question now before the people of Canada. A great many will look forward to hearing the National Organizer upon this subject as there is still a good deal of vagueness in the minds of some as to the plans and purposes of the organization.

Three merchants of Queens County were summoned by the Inland Revenue Department, to appear at the County Court on Saturday last, for violation of the Special War Revenue Act, 1915, and amendments. They were charged with neglecting to affix the necessary War-Tax Stamps on patent medicines, and tooth paste at time of sale. They appeared before Mr. Henry Smith J. P., Saturday afternoon, and were fined \$50.00 and costs. Barrister C. R. Smallwood conducted the prosecution for the Department. The officer of the Department who made the purchase was the chief witness for the prosecution. The Department is determined that throughout Canada this Act shall be rigidly enforced, and from time to time have their officers make inspectional visits, purchasing different articles, toilet articles, matches, and playing cards are sometimes sold to officers without being stamped, hence the report, and then the prosecution.

A bold robbery took place at Souris on Thursday of last week as the result of which five men appeared before Mr. James McCormack, J. P., on Monday, and were remanded for further hearing until Monday next. The robbery took place at the Sample rooms of Mr. S. B. Campbell. An entrance was made by breaking a pane of glass in the front window, the thieves getting through this opening and unfastening the door from the inside.

Several trunks belonging to a travelling salesman, were stolen, removed to a field and a lot of clothing taken out.

The goods stolen comprised 25 pairs pants, two dozen shirts, a lot of men's and ladies gloves, lumbermens socks, several coats, shirts collars, etc.—in all goods valued at \$190.

The services of Sergeant Bradley of Charlottetown were secured and on Sunday afternoon as the outcome of his investigations five men were placed under arrest.

Three of the missing coats, ten pairs pants and one collar were found in the surf on the shore, and some of the other clothing in a boat in a yard near by.

POULTRY WORK—Mr. Harry Hyde, Cornwall, was in the city yesterday. He visited the office of the Dominion Poultry representative and reported the results of the demonstration held in Cornwall Egg circle during the past season. Mr. Hyde stated that he culled thirty hens from his flock of sixty kept them separate for some time. From the thirty hens culled he received only four eggs during the time of separation. The thirty good producers laid as many eggs during this time as were received from the original flock of sixty thus proving the wisdom of culling the unprofitable birds from the flock. The Poultry Division of the Live Stock Branch have been holding demonstrations along this line in almost every section of the Island and similar good results are in evidence wherever they have been tried.

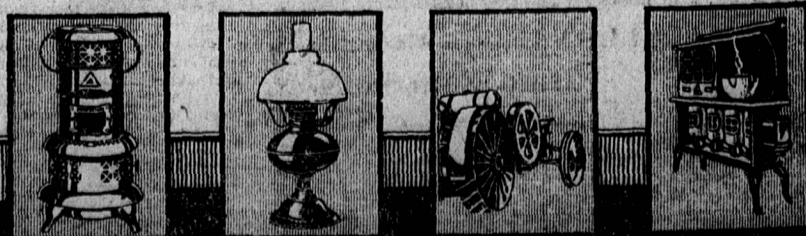
