BADE FAREWELL TO LEPER HUSBAND

MINES BJOMING AT SYDNEY C.B.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—A most pathetic scene, illustrating the devotion of a wife and mother to her husband, was enacted here yesterday when Mrs. John Early, the wife of the South Carolina leper, whose terrible affliction was discovered by the Washington health authorities some days ago, visited Early's isolated quarters on the banks of the Potomac to bid him a farewell.

Early's disposition had been decided upon by the health authorities of Washington and the officials of a leper colony in the south. Through the arrangement affected the unfortunate South Carolinian is to spend the remainder of his days at the southern colony.

Mrs. Early, who was unaware of her husband's affliction when he left home to come to Washington, arrived here yesterday and was driven to Early's isolated tent.

Arriving at the tent, she approached to within a distance of about twenty feet and conversed with her husband. The scene was most affecting. Mrs. Early expressed a willingness to go with her husband to the leper colony to care for and comfort him as best she could. Early, keenly sensitive of the fate in store for him, explained to the wife that he wished her return to their former home and care for their children and that he would not wish her to sacrifice herself for him.

Separated as they were, they bade each other an affectionate farewell and Early retired to his tent to await deportation to Louisiana, while his wife was driven back to the Salvation Army headquarters, where she is being cared for during her stay in Washington.

Early contracted the disease in the Philippines, where he served as a soldier.

ON BOARD THE ITALIAN CRUISER.

HALIFAX, Sept. 3.—Tuesday afternoon General Purdy paid an official visit to the commander of the cruiser Ettore Fieramosca. He was received with a salute. At eleven o'clock yesterday His Worship Mayor Crosby returned the official call of Commander Lorecchio. He was accompanied by City Clerk Monahan.

The ship is open to public inspection between the hours of three p. m. and six p. m. daily, except when coaling. Some of the officers and men speak English, and a hearty welcome is given all visitors.

Commander Lorecchio is a splendid officer. He speaks English and those having the pleasure of meeting him are at once attracted by his charming personality. Yesterday he was the guest of the exhibition commission. He was much interested in the racing and other features of the show.

A Herald reporter was on board the cruiser yesterday. She is a model of cleanliness. Her cabins have much rich carving about them, and the whole equipment of the ship is of a superior character.

The cruiser has the Marconi wireless system of telegraphy. She was in touch with Lamperdown on her way here from Boston.

The commander will visit Montreal, and the ship will remain here during his absence. He will go and return by rail.

On Sunday the officers will attend at St. Mary's cathedral.

ONTARIO BANK CLERK DISAPPEARS.

KINGSTON, Ont., Sept. 3.—Harry Purdy, a young clerk in the employ of the Metropolitan Bank at Harrowsmith is missing and with him has disappeared a parcel containing \$1,200 in bank bills. He was given the parcel to send to the head office at Toronto. Instead of doing so, he appears to have pocketed it and made a dash across the border. He went through the night the parcel was stolen and was undoubtedly in the United States by the next morning.

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 3.—The output of coal at the mines of the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Company in the month of August exceeded that of the previous month by about 400 tons. The figures would have gone over 60,000 tons had not a break occurred in the working days, caused by the men observing the annual P. W. A. day and on that day the mines closed.

Following are the figures for the different collieries—No. 1, 19,344; No. 2, 4,010; No. 3, 23,359; No. 4, 1,444; No. 5, 9,731; a total of 58,868 tons.

The coke blast furnace open hearth is running in full force. The prospects for the company's continued prosperity were never brighter than at the present time. The open hearth resumed operations a few days ago after an output from that department came out Monday.

TRAWLERS ARE BAD FOR FISHERY.

HALIFAX, Sept. 3.—Bernard Cumming, of Port Joli, secretary of the Fishermen's union, is in Halifax for the annual meeting of the union which convenes to-day at ten o'clock. One of the subjects to come up will be the consideration of measures for the more rigid enforcement of the laws for the protection of the lobster industry. Mr. Cumming says that lobsters less than the minimum of nine inches are taken wholesale to the green market and the fishery. The union is strong for the enforcement of the standard.

The union is opposed to the use of the beam trawler which they allege is ruinous to the shore fisheries. It scoops up everything, good or bad, large or small, and destroys the spawning ground. The fish that are marketable are taken from its net and cured, the rest are thrown overboard, and the ocean is strewn with dead fish. That this is so Mr. Cumming says is proved by eye-witnesses, who have seen it on Bank Quay. The effect of these trawlers, Mr. Cumming contends, has been found to be very injurious on the coasts of Scotland and England.

Fishery this year, both shore and bank, was good, but prices are low compared with last season. In fact prices to the fishermen have not been more than half what they were a year ago.

TRAINS OF PULLMANS CRASHED INTO EACH OTHER.

ANDOVER, Mass., Sept. 3.—A train of empty Pullmans bound from Boston for Portland, Me., crashed into the rear of a heavily loaded passenger train on the western division of the Boston & Maine railroad, just north of this station last night, smashing the rear car of the passenger train, but causing bad injuries to only one passenger. Dennis Lane, of Haverhill, was considerably cut about the head and shoulders and received medical attention. Although the other passengers were much shaken up none of them required the services of a physician.

The rear car of the passenger train was so badly smashed that it was taken off and after some delay again proceeded. The engine of the Pullman train was considerably damaged, but continued on its way to Portland.

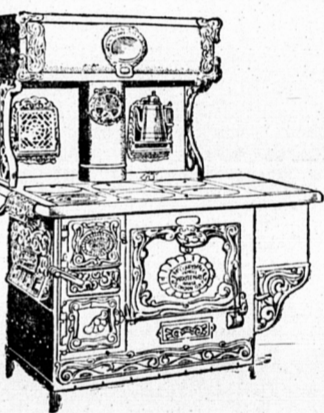
