We desire to reason with our citizen readers of all classes in a dispassionate way with regard to the observance and enforcement of the existing prohibitory law. And the first point we desire to accentuate is that until it has been pronounced upon and declared to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction—which we do not believe will occur—it is as much the law of the land and it is as obligatory upon all good citizens to obey it as any other law upon the statute book. The fact that some persons doubt its constitutionality, and that some earnestly desire that it shall be declared unconstitutional has nothing whatever to do with the case.

In the next place as to the constitutionality question, it is a fact known to all lawyers of any standing that the right of Provincial Legislatures to prohibit the sale of liquors within and for consumption within the Provincial boundary is beyond question, having been so declared by the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council. Moreover it is also a fact well-known alike to lawyers and intelligent laymen throughout Canada that repeated decisions of the Privy Council from the date of Confederation down to the present time have always been along the line of extending rather than diminishing the authority of Provincial Legislatures, so that the powers of these bodies are now known to be much larger and wider than was at first supposed.

The fact that the Court of King's Bench in Manitoba has declared the Manitoba Prohibitory Law to be ultra vires has been relied upon by some persons as a reason for believing that the Island Prohibitory Law is also invalid. But it is to be observed that the conditions existing in the two Provinces of Manitoba and Prince Edward Island are altogether different, one condition being that the Hudson's Bay Company have trading powers in Manitoba under their charter granted by the Imperial Parliament long ago, which powers neither the Dominion nor local Parliaments can take away. Among these powers is the right to sell liquor. This is a condition not existing in P. E. Island. Then again the two Prohibitory laws are different, ours having been framed to avoid the points which were thought to be doubtful in the Manitoba Law. Furthermore the Court of King's Bench in declaring the Manitoba Law invalid did not specify any particular section of the Law as invalid, but pronounced a general and rather confused judgment against the validity of the Law as a whole.

We have also the fact that since, and notwithstanding the judgment of the Court of King's Bench, the Hon. David Mills, Minister of Justice of Canada has given his opinion that the Island Prohibitory Law is valid and entirely within the powers of our Legislature to enact. Moreover we do not believe that the judgment of the Manitoba Court will be sustained by the Judicial Committee to which august body it is being carried by appeal. That, however, remains to be seen. But even should the Manitoba Law be denounced by the highest tribunal in the Empire, it will by no means follow that the Island Prohibitory Law will not stand good. As we have said the two laws are different in important particulars and the conditions existing before they were passed were different. Moreover the Manitoba Act was passed by a Government not favorable to Prohibition by conviction, for Hugh John Macdonald declared himself opposed to Prohibition, and that against his conviction he was enacting a law because public sentiment demanded it.

We claim therefore that all good citizens should confidently and sympathetically obey and support the law as it stands. Its object is good. If fifty thousand dollars a

year, the amount estimated to have been expended last year in the liquor saloons of Charlottetown, can be turned into the dry goods, grocery, book and other stores of the City, it would surely be a good thing. If working men and others who have been a part of the time idle because of drink, and who have spent the greater part of their wages in drink, would be kept more steadily at work and spend their wages in making provision for their families, it would surely be a good thing, to say nothing of the heart-break and misery which would cease to exist if we had a sober town. Such are the objects of the Prohibitory Law, and behind it are the prayers of thousands.

If we turn to the other side, why should any good citizen sympathize with the rum-seller, much less with the illicit rum-seller? Ask yourself, would it not be better if every saloon in the City were closed and kept closed forever. The fact is clear that these men are in the trade simply for the money there is in it, quite regardless of the consequences to their victims and their families. Lawyers can be found to plead their causes in court, if well paid for the doubtful task. City Councillors can be found who will truckle to the vote of the saloons. But why should any honest citizen, who has the welfare of the community and of his family at heart, waste sympathy upon these law-breakers? Even the majority of City Councillors would feel themselves too reputable to engage in liquor selling were it now a lawful business. Then why throw a shelter around the men who are selling in violation of the law?

It was in no selfish or vindictive spirit that the law was enacted or is now to be enforced. The Government of the day threw away some thousands of dollars of revenue to give this law which the people demanded. It is for the good of all and not for the injury of any that the law is now being enforced. Let all obey the law and no one will be harmed. At the same time every real public interest demands that the law shall be carried out, and the community should lend its sympathy and hearty cooperation. Especially is this necessary until the law has had its trial in the law courts and has been pronounced good. After that we trust and believe that it will prove still further, what in the past few days has been amply demonstrated, that it is a great instrument for good. And the opponents of the law may rest assured that when the law has once safely passed the judicial tests to which it will be subjected no Legislature of Prince Edward Island will ever repeal it.

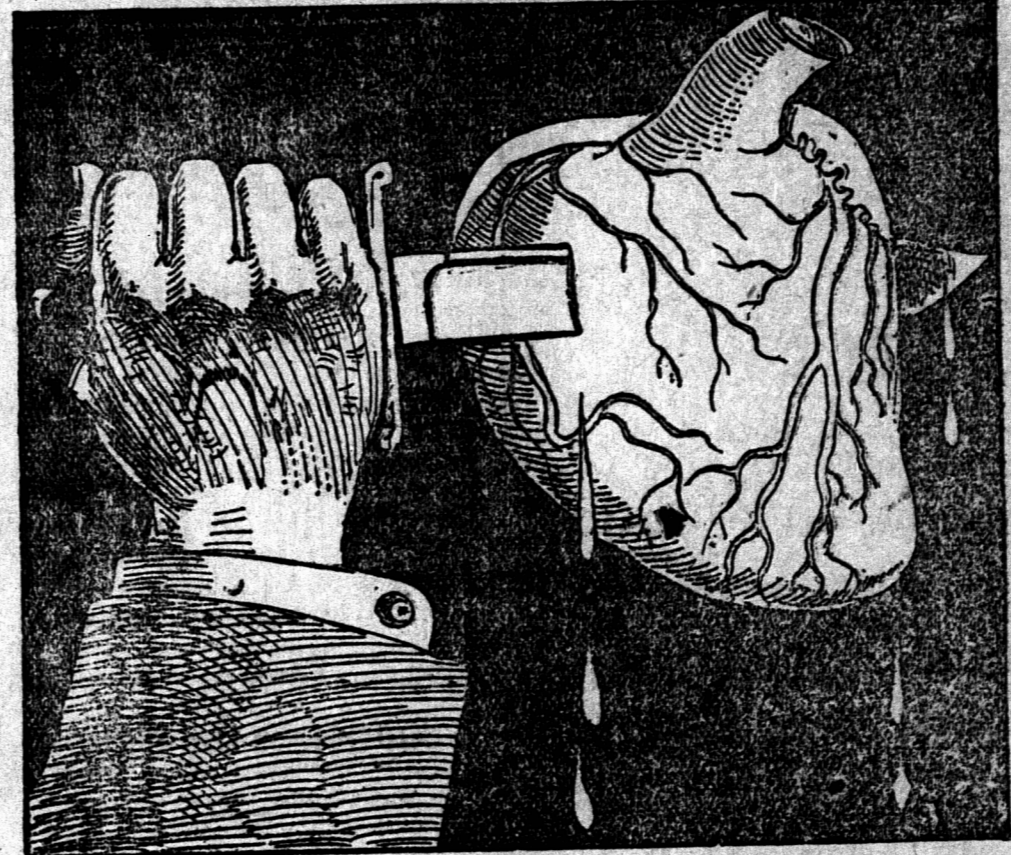
