An Ambassador Of Friendship

(New York Tribune)

The Prince of Wales is described as a tight-lipped and serious-faced as he stood in final salute before sailing for his tour of Canada and the United States. The Prince appreciates that his journey is not a mere pleasure jaunt. A heavy burden is laid upon young shoulders. The Prince is Friendship's Ambassador Extraordinary to Canada and the United States. As the London News says, "Through him the peoples of the empire will express in the fullest sense their fellowship with the people of America."

It is an ambassadorship which will require all the store of modesty and tact which the Prince is reputed to possess. He has one advantage, however, that of the precedent set by his grandfather, the late Edward VII., fifty-nine years ago. If Edward Albert proves as winning as was Albert Edward, the success of the coming visit is assured. Coming at a time when memories still made Englishmen and Americans ill at ease in one another's company, there was some fear lest unpleasant incidents might arise. But the visitor handled every situation with a grace beyond his years. And every American, from the Pennsylvania mayor who could not forbear a reminder that the Prince was now in a state that was one of the leaders in the Revolution, to the last surviving soldier of the Revolution, admitted the Prince was a good fellow. This last survivor, on whom the Prince called in Boston, was gracious in itself, explaining afterward that "he wished to show the boy and his soldiers that he bore no anger for old times."

Entering the United States at Detroit as will the coming visitor, Albert Edward, who had shed his suite at the border and travelled as "Lord Renfrew," went from one rousing reception to another and won American hearts by the reverent pilgrimage to the tomb of Washington. New York prepared in his honor "the greatest ball ever known in this country," and the Prince is reported to have enjoyed hugely dancing with American belles, naively remarking that elsewhere they made him dance with the "old chaps."

The visit of Albert Edward was a brief interlude before the breaking of the storm of the Civil War. His grandson comes at the close of a greater war. As a veteran of that war, as one who carried a kit bag with the rest, he will be welcomed by his American comrades, as he was by the Canadians in the front line trenches, "for the man he was and not for his rank."

Great War Veterans Parade for the Prince

All returned men who are taking part in the G. W. V. A. Parade will assemble at the Arena Rink at 10:30 sharp on Tuesday morning. The parade will then march through the principal streets of the city to Victoria Park for the presentation of medals by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. Uniforms or civies are optional as is a great number of the boys have not retained their uniforms. As this parade is only for about two hours, it is desirable to have as large a turnout as possible, and a large number of the returned men from the outlying districts are expected to take part that day.
