LONDON INAUGURATES TRAINING SCHOOL FOR PROSPECTIVE BRIDES

Girls who marry and go abroad need no longer worry whether they will be able to "manage."

The Empire Citizenship Council inaugurated a three month course for these girls, starting May 1.

They will be taught all branches of typical domestic hygiene, so that they will have no difficulty in starting housekeeping under entirely strange conditions.

"The three-months' course will cost 12 guineas," a member of the council said. "There will also be a one-month course during July which will cost five guineas. The teachers will be at experts at their job."

"There will be a professor from the London School of Economics a chef from a big London hotel ladies from several of the principal infant welfare centres in London, and others from the chief countries overseas with a full knowledge of conditions there."

Those taking the course will gain a general knowledge of existing social services, first-aid and home nursing, initiation and running of infant welfare centres. V. A. detachments, and so on.

So far only a very few girls have taken advantage of the opportunity offered them of becoming perfect wives.

"The whole venture is still in an experimental stage," its sponsor emphasized. "If it proves successful, we hope to establish branches in other parts of the country, beginning with Liverpool and Edinburgh."

—ADDRESSED ON FOX PROBLEMS—On Thursday a number of the Inspectors of the C.N.S.F.B.A. were addressed by Mr. G. Ennis Smith and Mr. John Jack on various problems in connection with the raising of foxes, and were given instruction in field work. Among those attending the lectures were Mr. T. D. Carruthers, Mr. Aldred England, L. W. Smith, Sussex, N.B., and W. F. Burke. These gentlemen left on Friday to do field work in the various provinces. They will visit the ranchers and discuss with them various problems in connection with the ranching of foxes. Inspectors in the different provinces are: T. D. Carruthers, Ontario; L. W. Smith, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; Aldred England, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, and the Rainy River District of Ontario.
