## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

THE LABOREERS IN THE VINEYARD.

LESSON. Matthew xx. 1-16

JULY 5.

GOLDEN TEXT. Matthew v. 45.

"That ye may be the sons of your Father which is in heaven: for he maketh his sun to rise on the evil and good, and sendeth rain on the just and the unjust."

### THE NARRATIVE

The parable was the outcome of the incident with the young ruler; not that it has any direct bearing thereupon, but that it has to do with the effect produced upon the disciples by that incident. Matthew tells us that when the young man went away sorrowful, Jesus said to His disciples, "Verily I say unto you, it is hard for a rich man to enter into the Kingdom of Heaven. And again I say unto you, it is easier for a camel to go through a needle's eye, than for a rich man to enter the Kingdom of God." The disciples were exceedingly astonished at such a declaration, and inquired, "Who then can be saved?" and the Lord replied that with God all things were possible.

It was then that Peter said, "Lo, we have left all, and followed Thee; what then shall we have?" The question was evidently the outcome of the incident, and our Lord's teaching concerning it. The young man had refused to leave all and follow Christ. Peter said, "We have done it; and inquired what advantage it would be to them, what reward they would have. The parable of the laborers in the vineyard is our Lord's answer to that inquiry. Before uttering it, however, He definitely told Peter that the twelve would be associated with Him in an actual reign over the tribes of Israel, and added that all who left everything to follow Him would receive an hundred-fold and inherit eternal life; that is, that they would gain what the young man sought, if they did what he failed to do.

The teaching ended with the words, "But many shall be last that are first, and first that are last." This was a warning, and was immediately followed by the parable, the parable

being followed by the words, "So the last shall be first, and first last." It is thus evident that the parable is an illustration of that word of warning by which it was prefaced, and by which it was followed.

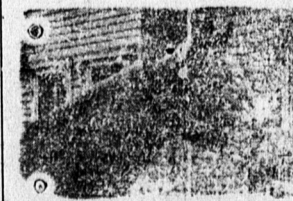
The parable itself is perfect simple and plain, and the reading of it is sufficient to understand it in its main movement. There are certain matters that we should specially fasten upon our minds. The words of our Lord declare that it is a parable of the Kingdom Heaven, consequently the householder represents the Kingdom. He is presented as seeking laborers, whom he will hire to work in his vineyard. In doing this he began in the early morning; and with those whom he first appointed he made a definite agreement. Prosecuting his quest subsequently during the day at the ninth, he found laborers, sent them into his vineyard to work, making no agreement with any of them, but leading them to take up the work he offered, trusting in him as to payment. At the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing idle, and asked them why they did so. They replied that that no man had hired them, and so he sent them into the vineyard.

When the day was over, the laborers were called together to be paid, and the steward was commanded to end with the first. As we observe the payment of these men, we notice that the amount received by the first was strictly just, and in accord with agreement made. That given to the last was characterized by generosity, while nevertheless it was a payment in perfect justice, because these men had worked throughout the whole time available to them. The out-

14 Pups from 4 Pairs Of Last Year's Pups Who Can Beat It?
