ROCKET TO GO 40 MILES UP

ROME, July 18—A rocket, calculated to reach a height of forty miles, will be launched from the desert of Tripoli by Professor Darwin Lyon, an American famous for his experiments with rockets. Equipped with instruments to record the conditions of the upper atmosphere, the rocket, which Professor Lyon has just completed, is made of specially strong and light steel. It will be projected into space by successive explosions, caused by an explosive of which he alone holds the secret.

An altitude of ten miles was recently reached by Professor Piccard's rocket.

WOMEN URGE STERILIZATION OF UNFIT

LONDON, July 18—Twelve hundred women delegates, attending the congress of the Women's Co-operative Guild, have passed a resolution urging compulsory sterilization of the unfit.

One member of the Guild quoted statistics showing that there were nearly half a million mentally defective men and women in England. She declared that this number was rapidly increasing and the problem was becoming unmanageable. Segregation was impossible, it was stated.

She described an instance of where 14 mentally defective women brought 100 illegitimate children into the world.

INSECTS WILL MAKE LEGAL HISTORY

PARIS, July 18—The sad story of three insects of the night is making an important contribution to French law.

The tale begins when the trio, who had free board and lodging in a Paris hotel, alighted in the course of their midnight peregrinations on a visit or thereafter called the plaintiff. Instead of giving vent to his murderous instincts, the plaintiff contented himself with imprisoning them in a small bottle. Then he called the police, who viewed his "evidence," and satisfied themselves that the plaintiff had been the victim of sanguinary intentions.

The most strenuous efforts on the part of the plaintiff, however, has failed to keep the "exhibits" alive. He fed them regularly and appropriately, but all in vain, and in the unfamiliar atmosphere of the bottle they pined and died. So instead of calling three vivacious witnesses, Charles Girou will have to produce three little corpses on behalf of the plaintiff, who is suing the hotel proprietor for \$120.

SHIP MODEL BREASTS MAN-MADE WIND AND WAVES



The above photograph is of an 18-foot model of the new giant Cunarder now under construction at Clydebank, Scotland, in the yards of John Brown & Co. The model is shown floating in a special built experimental tank in which Atlantic Ocean conditions were reproduced in miniature. Wind and waves were artificially produced by mechanical devices to subject the model to severe tests. The new Cunarder will be the largest ship afloat, and will gross 78,000 tons. She will be 1,016 feet long. Details of her construction, which it is said will embody principles entirely new to ship building, are being jealously guarded. The picture above is the first to reach Canada of the model of the new Cunarder.
