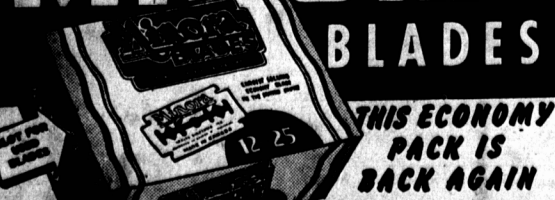

Manager Lou Boudreau of Cleveland: "We're going to pitch Feller September 22. We thought it was all set for Newhouse to pitch, too."

Newhouse recalled that Feller had beaten him twice before the war. After Bob returned from the navy last summer, he beat Hal and the Tigers August 24 on a four-hitter. A week later they faced each other again and both were knocked out and didn't figure in the decision.

Huot Captures Canadian Pro Golf Crown

OTTAWA, Sept. 11—(CP)—Julius Huot, dapper 38-year-old from Laval-sur-Le-Lac, Quebec, today captured the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association championship by turning in a 295 total in the 72-hole medal play tournament at Rivermead golf course.

Slipping from a 154-under-par performance on yesterday's 36 holes, Huot carded a 74 and 80 on the last two rounds but held a four-point winning margin over his closest competitors.

A triple tie for second place was shared by Gordie Brydson of Toronto, Ontario, and Alvin Johnston of Toronto Scarborough and Bobby Alston of the Gaitheue Club, Aymer Quebec, all with a total of 299.

Languid in the weather, golfers found Rivermead's 6,470-yard course still soggy from heavy rains yesterday, and scurs generally were over the par 72.

The leaders will share \$1,000 in prize money while Huot wins the Columbia Trophy—an award in competition this year for the first time—donated to the C. P. G. A. by J. P. Collett, honorary president of the association.
