CIVILIANS LOOKED LIKE MILITARY MEN.

ST. PETERSBURG, Thursday May 5.—An Imperial order is issued, undoing one of the characteristic measures of Plehve, whose desire it was to see every man in Russia in a uniform indicating his rank and occupation. Heads of civilian departments designed uniforms resembling as closely as possible those of the military with shoulder straps and other marks of rank, with the result that it is now almost impossible to distinguish civilian officials from officers. The Emperor, on the recommendation of the Ministers of War and Marine, has now ordered, except for officials of the police and prison departments, allowing the department clerks and officials three months to wear out the old uniforms.

PARIS TELEPHONES

PARIS, May 5.—Unquestionably the French postal department is awakening to the inadequacy of the present telephone system here. After sending M. Milton, an engineer, to the United States to study the various systems in that country, M. Millerand, the Minister of Public Works, has succeeded in securing the promise of a loan of \$4,000,000 from the chamber of commerce. This \$4,000,000 is only about one-sixth of the total sum needed for the complete overhauling of the present system. But M. Millerand considers that having this much to start with the city of Paris will not be slow in supplying the rest.

The proposed alterations may be grouped under three headings: Changes of material extension of service and reduction of prices. The most important reforms under the first heading will be a uniform type of apparatus. The great difference between the models now in use is often the cause of delays. The extension of service will include the construction of many auxiliary lines. It is because there are so few of these that subscribers find it almost impossible to get connections during the busy hours. The reduction of prices is a logical outcome of this last reform. Naturally if there is a greater facility of communication, the number of subscribers will increase, and it will be possible to reduce the subscribers' rates.

None of these improvements will be undertaken until M. Milton returns from America and gives the postal department the benefit of his investigations.

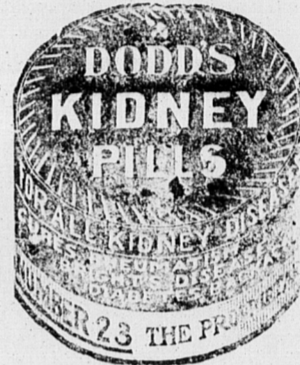

JURYMAN WAS FRIEND OF PLAINTIFF'S FAMILY

BRAMPTON, May 5.—A very peculiar circumstance arose in the Assize Court here this morning. Yesterday afternoon an action for damages brought by Robert Gaunt, of Streetsville, against the C. P. R. Company was commenced. The plaintiff is suing for ten thousand dollars damages for the death of his son, who was killed at the crossing in Streetsville in August last. It is claimed that neither the whistle blew nor the bell rang at the approach of the train. The evidence of the plaintiff was nearly all in when the court adjourned yesterday. At the reassembling this morning it was learned that one of the jurymen was an intimate friend of the family of the plaintiff. This circumstance was brought to the attention of the court. After consultation between his Lordship, Mr. Justice Britton, Angus MacMurphy, P. B., and B. F. Justin, K. C., solicitor for the plaintiff, his Lordship dismissed the jury and decided to re-try the evidence already heard. One of the former jurymen was retained.
