Brides of Canadian soldiers who  
are on active service overseas, are  
expecting to visit Canada in the  
near future, and I. O. D. E. chapters  
have been requested by the Ontario  
Provincial Chapter I. O. D. E. to

### HOT MARMALADE BISCUITS

Use standard recipe for biscuits.  
Roll dough to 1/4 inch thickness,  
cut with small round biscuit cutter.  
Make a depression in half of  
the rounds and fill with orange  
marmalade. Moisten edges of dough  
with a little milk, and lay another  
round on top, pressing down slightly.  
Bake in hot oven.

For a different dressing to serve  
on fruit salad, add 1 teaspoon of  
chopped maraschino cherries and  
1 tablespoon of orange juice to  
boiled salad dressing.

When you serve fishballs, drain  
first on brown paper and then tuck  
into an old napkin and keep them  
hot. The napkin absorbs any grease  
left on them and they will be crisp  
and dainty.

### SOILED PILLOWS CAN BE CLEANED

After much use, feather pillows  
get soiled. This does not mean that  
the conscientious housewife cannot  
wash them just as they are, with-  
out bothering to transfer the feath-  
ers to a linen bag. The feather pil-  
low will be as good as new if the  
following suggestions are adopted.

First a slit about four inches  
long should be cut at one end of  
the pillow. A square of muslin  
should then be sewn securely over  
the slit. This effectively allows the  
sunny water in and out.

To give the best results, only one  
pillow at a time should be placed  
in the washing machine. So that the  
feathers will be soft and pliable,  
extra heavy lukewarm suds  
should be used. If the water be-  
comes to dirty, or the bubbles go  
flat, mix fresh suds. Bad spots on  
the cover may be rubbed with a  
brush.

After the cover and pillow are  
clean, rinse three or four times in  
tepid water, and squeeze out the  
excess moisture.

## THE COOK'S CORNER

### RHUBARB BLUEBERRY JAM

4 cups blueberries.  
4 cups rhubarb.  
1 cup water.  
4 cups sugar.

**METHOD:** Wash and trim the  
rhubarb and cut into about 1 inch  
lengths. Place in a preserving ket-  
tle and add the water. Heat to the  
boiling point and keep at this tem-  
perature for 10 minutes. Turn into  
a sieve and press through as much  
of the pulp as possible. Now meas-  
ure 2 cups of this.

Place blueberries in a preserving  
kettle and add the rhubarb pulp  
and bring to a boil. Keep boiling for  
10 minutes. Then add the sugar and  
stir the mixture over a low heat to  
dissolve the sugar, bring to a boil  
and cook until the mixture is thick  
and clear. Turn into hot, sterilized  
jars and seal with melted paraffin.  
Add a second layer of this when the  
first has hardened and cover jars  
with lids or paper. Store jars in a  
cool, dry place.
